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

REMENHAM PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

The PCC met on 30 August with 12 members present. Mr Walley took the chair.

The main business was the discussion of the proposed new diocesan scheme for allocating the future 'parish share' - the contribution made by each parish to the central funds of the diocese. The Church Commissioners are already reducing, and will in a short time entirely phase out, their support to dioceses and will cease to allocate money for clergy pension contributions in 1998, so that continuing increases in our 'quota' will be necessary to make up the shortfall. The new scheme was outlined in the September issue of The Door. It retains the 1995 parish share as the basis for the future and proposes that the necessary extra annual amounts should be added to it in proportion to the number of stipendiary clergy in each parish. For 1996, the extra amount will be £1,100 per stipendiary post and in the case of Remenham we shall share that extra contribution with St Mary's. Henley, in the proportion of approximately 1:4. Thus our extra contribution in 1996 will amount to just over £275 which is much smaller than the increases we have had to face in recent years. After 1996 it is estimated that contributions will rise by approximately 6% per year. The PCC approved the scheme and our representatives voted in its favour at the Henley Deanery Synod on 19 September, when it was approved with only one lay and three clergy votes against it. It now goes to the Diocesan Synod for final decision.

The presentation to Alan and Joyce Pyburn amounted to approximately £1,700. The Pyburns are settling in happily to their cottage at Finstock and they hope to

use the money towards the cost of a conservatory, where they will relax in the intervals of Alan rushing round north Oxfordshire helping out with services.

The renewal of the electrical wiring and heating in the Church has been completed in good time for the winter. The total cost was about £8,000 and any further contributions will be gratefully received. The main business at the next PCC meeting on 29 November will be a discussion of fund-raising. Suggestions will be welcomed and should be sent to Mr Walley.

THE INTERREGNUM - On 4 September we held the Vacancy Meeting at St Mary's, with the Bishop. The Archdeacon, the Lay Chairman of the Deanery synod and a representative of Jesus College Oxford (the patron of Remenham), to discuss the appointment of Alan Pyburn's successor. A number of important issues concerning the future of the benefice and the pastoral needs of the parishes were discussed. It was agreed that the vacancy should not be generally advertised at this stage, as considerable interest was already being shown in the appointment. The Bishop, Archdeacon and the parish representatives will meet in late October to draw up a short-list of candidates, who will then be invited to visit the benefice and meet some members of both parishes. The aim is to proceed to interviews and a decision by the end of the year in the hope that the new incumbent may be inducted by Easter. Please join in our prayers for a successful outcome.

In the meantime, our services continue as before with the much appreciated assistance of the Rev Canon Day, Michael Crowther-Green, Philip Parker and Mr Anthony Green. Next meeting of the PCC. Wednesday, 29 November, at 8.00 pm in the Parish Hall.

Pat over the past years has helped the Parish in many ways, attending meetings, being part of committees that reflect the views and problems of Remenham. A very careful keeper of records, she has on more than one occasion come to our rescue. Pat's invaluable

The Council have purchased five mature trees, three walnuts and two red horsechestnuts, to plant in the Parish this autumn. We hope to double the number each to the year 2000. So next year we will be looking for help - if people wish to purchase a tree for the Parish and, indeed, have any ideas of worthy sites for planting from next year onwards, please let us know.

One final comment on the Lanes, Aston Lane and Remenham Lane between the Church and the Regatta Course. Thefts from motor vehicles are still too high and the two hot spots continue to be Benson's Night Club car park and the area by Remenham church, although I have to say there have been significant reductions over the last two years of thefts from motor vehicles by the church. All the other offences are so insignificant in number that they are not worth worrying about.

One other thing worth mentioning is that the people who offer to do your driveway on the cheap are back. Be very careful. If you want a satisfactory job done, why not contact a reputable person who is listed in the book rather than someone who may have a hidden agenda. Be vigilant and you won't end up another crime statistic.

Finally, I won't be able to cover the Police surgery set for 22.10.95 at 15.30 as I shall be on annual leave. I'm encouraged by the improvement in the crime figures. Let us hope we can continue the downward trend.

Our customers were as charming and appreciative as ever, although we stood firm against persuasive arguments that our efforts should extend beyond August, no one wishing to be cooked to a frazzle.

At the end of the month a sum in excess of £600 had been added to the church coffers and we look forward to meeting again next August and perhaps by then we can offer as a speciality a Remenham roulade crammed with cranberries and cream.

THE ROYAL NATIONAL LIFEBOAT INSTITUTION

The RNLI (founded in 1824 by Sir William Hillary, himself a lifeboatman) is a charity, supported entirely by voluntary contributions, with the sole aim of saving life at sea. It is the oldest national lifeboat service in the world.

Lifeboatmen and women are volunteers who, in addition to their everyday jobs, are ready to answer distress calls at any time of the year, day or night. In 1995 it will cost around £58 million to run the RNLI (£150,000 per day). For every £1 given, 80 pence is spent on maintaining and purchasing equipment or shore facilities: 15 pence is used for fundraising and 5 pence for administration.

Everybody, young and old, can help the RNLI. Individuals and families can join the subscription scheme "Shoreline". "Storm Force" is the under 16s membership club. The RNLI can be named a beneficiary in a will. Postage stamps and foreign coins can be converted into cash. Christmas cards and souvenirs can be purchased.

NEWS FROM THE POTTING SHED

The very mild weather of early October has meant that many trees and shrubs have kept their leaves longer than usual resulting in beautiful displays of red and gold in the local lanes and gardens. Add some more autumn colouring plants to your garden to extend the gardening season. Virginia Creeper, Japanese Maples and members of the Berberis family would all be excellent choices, and can be planted now while the soil is still warm.

When the leaves do start to fall, take great care to remove them from your drought recovering lawns. Leaves can be swept up and put in sealed black plastic sacks. Punch some holes in the sacks to allow drainage and in about eighteen months

you will have rich leaf mould. This can be dug into your borders to give extra humus and to improve the water retention of your soil.

There is still time to plant some tulips for flowering next spring. These look delightful growing through beds of pansies, forget-me-not or the traditional wallflowers.

Next year's seed catalogues are falling thick and fast through letter boxes. Take advantage of the longer evenings to settle down in front of the fire, and make plans for 1996!

RECIPE FOR THE MONTH

Cold, wintry days call for dishes that warm the cockles of your heart. This one works like central heating!

Chicken Casserole

Chicken fillets.

Onions. Carrots, Leeks, Swedes, Peppers. Mushrooms [or any other mix of vegetables you prefer.]

Brown the chicken on both sides, sauté the onions, put all the ingredients into a casserole, add stock cube and thicken with flour, season to taste. Cook until tender.

With all the rich food over Christmas, this is a super simple pudding.

Lemon Sauce Pudding

4 oz sugar

Rind and juice of two lemons

2 oz butter

quarter pint milk

2 oz self raising flour

2 eggs [separated]

Cream together the butter and sugar. Beat in the two yolks of eggs; add the flour and the rind and juice of the lemon and the milk. Mix well, then add the stiffly beaten whites and fold them in. Bake in a greased pie dish, standing in a roasting tin containing hot water to reach about half way up the dish for about 40 - 45 minutes or so Gas Mk 4, [350 °F or 180 °C] until golden brown. The top will be baked and the bottom has a delicious lemon sauce.


