

Planting on Remenham Hill

Congratulations to Linda and her team for completing the planting on Remenham Hill. See her article.

The Borough Council has issued instruction that the verges may not be cut until summer, please ring me immediately if you see anyone trying to do so. (This applies to Aston Crescent as well). Please also help us by discouraging the use of the verges.

Highways Initiative

Thank you very much for replying to the questionnaire for those who did. I received a huge number of replies. For those who did not please email me for the questionnaire and I will be extremely grateful for its return.

As expected, there is no clear consensus on every issue, but there seems to be on:

- If there is enough commitment of residents, we should try to put pressure on Oxfordshire to alter the programming on the bridge to ease traffic congestion.
- We should attempt to lower the speed on the lanes to 20mph
- We should try to find a solution to the rat run, but those I have put forward disadvantage part of the village disproportionately

There was a question as to why I have issued the questionnaire and why it came from me. I am lobbying various bodies all the time on your behalf to do various things. Mostly the outcome which the residents would like is self-evident. In this case it is not. I am conscious

that what may be of benefit to some will be a detriment to others. I prefer to go slowly with the support of the village and seek consensus around the disagreements.

What came out clearly from the replies that I have had is that we do not have many who understand, are capable and willing on social media – please let yourself be known if you are.

Thamesbridge House

A planning application has been put forward for Thamesbridge House, which I believe the planner are largely content with. Your Parish council had some reservations on its design — a little too office like, the relationship of the new building to Bird Place and just how the building will be built without causing traffic chaos or massive disruption to its neighbours.

The Budget and Precept

A preliminary budget and the precept was approved for 2016/17.

Telephone Box and Message Boards

The message board at the village hall is broken. The telephone box at the top of Aston Lane needs substantial work. The parish council has agreed to refurbish the box and place it next to the hall to act as a notice board. If this is successful we may do this at the bridge and elsewhere.

Wokingham Borough Council

It seems that the government has changed direction from the coalition on council tax. Your borough council is permitted to raise council tax by up to 2% and by a further 2% is it is hypothecated to adult social care. It seems that this just below 4% is the expectation of the government and further years' settlements will assume that this was the case.

Local government funding is arcane in that the council collects business rates and passes them all to the government who kindly returns (in WBC's case) a small sum. This sum is to be reduced disproportionately which will create unheralded and unwelcome pressure on the borough council's finances. I would like to say that this is unreasonable but there are too many areas where I can see WBC is not optimal but vested interests prevent any change and financial pressure might.

REMENHAM AMATEUR GARDENERS - RAG

The RAG team triumphs with an exciting invitation:

Following on from my article in the Remenham Newsletter Nov/Dec 2015 issue, I now have great pleasure in reporting some tremendous work and a great achievement thanks to all those who volunteered their time for the benefit of the community in the parish of Remenham. LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD is Wokingham Borough Council's philosophy and is printed on the reflective workwear that was provided for all volunteers to wear whilst working. Nine people in all came forward and gave up a maximum 2 hours for each of the planting sessions that were organised. A massive thank you to our Chair of Councillors John Halsall, John Merkel Councillor and volunteers Juan, Kate, Alan, Mike, Roger and Selina. The picture below shows us working on our final session of this year.



A few statistics: 1450 crocus and 2720 Tête-à-Tête miniature narcissi have been planted in the roadside verges between Remenham Hill garage and Remenham Hill House. Local residents chose to plant a few bulbs that they purchased in the Remenham Terrace verge. It is scheduled to complete this planting by the RAG TEAM in 2016 along with the verges at the junction of Remenham Church Lane and Remenham Hill. The council has kindly allocated a further budget to us so if anyone has any ideas or requests for consideration then please do e-mail the RAG TEAM at hello@remenhamparish.org.uk.

A letter has been sent to all residents whose homes are adjacent to the planted areas asking them or their guests not to park on the verges. Temporary signage has also been put in place until more bollards are installed particularly to stop vehicles leaving the garage, running over the planted verges. The council has agreed to delay any grass cutting until late summer so that the bulbs can regenerate themselves and therefore flower again in 2017. For those residents who do sometimes cut the verges it would be very much appreciated if you could not undertake any grass cutting until at least six weeks after the flowers have died.

The work of this group has already been recognised with a very exciting invitation from Lord and Lady Heseltine who live in Northants. Their arboretum is not open to the public but is being opened to us and similar groups on SATURDAY 16th APRIL 2016 as a charity fundraiser costing £12 per person. Having had the privilege of visiting this garden in the springtime before I can say that it is absolutely stunning and so interesting. There are many features including medieval fish ponds, a lake, eighteenth-century walled garden, the grounds cover an area of 70 acres in which are planted over 3,500 different types of trees and shrubs. Additionally gifts that Lord and Lady Heseltine have been given are strategically placed in the grounds.

We have access between 2-5.30pm and everyone is given a map showing the layout. The church is open with beverages and cakes available in the Barn at extra cost. Toilets are also here. The terrain is quite rough so suitable footware is required. Dogs and children under 10, picnicking in the grounds or churchyard is NOT allowed. The Heseltines also own several interesting buildings in the attached village and also the pub where lunchtime food is available, it is planned to leave Remenham at 11am so that this area can be explored as well. Car sharing will be organised unless there are enough residents, there families and guests to fill a coach costing approximately £10 per head. As you would expect security is tight so a list of names needs to be sent in advance of our visit along with everyone's payment of £12. HENLEY CRICKET CLUB

Henley Cricket Club is a thriving home for cricketers of all abilities. Our sides accommodate cricketers young and old, from a lively junior section and a girls' team, through "leisure" cricketers to keen club cricketers playing league cricket at varying levels from the lower reaches of the Thames Valley League to the heights of the Home Counties Premier League Division One.

Our Henley ground plays host to our 1st and 2nd teams on alternate Saturdays. We also have a second ground in Nettlebed, shared with Nettlebed CC for the past four seasons, where our 3rd and 4th teams play. Junior and Ladies cricket, plus various friendlies, cup matches and even minor counties matches are also played, sometimes on Sundays and public holidays.

At Henley, it is still named the Brakspear Ground, reflecting the previous owners before the Club itself was able to purchase it in 2005 to provide a lasting legacy to the young and not-so-young people of Henley. This was in part enabled by a sizeable loan from Henley Town Council, the major part of which we have assiduously been paying off by dint of various fundraising enterprises, although a sizeable chunk remains outstanding and we continue to have to pay interest. We are currently engaging the Town Council to see if there is any way in which we could accelerate the clearing of our debt so as to concentrate on improving the ground and the running of the Club.

Last season proved both interesting and exciting for the Club. The 1st team just failed in its efforts to become the first Home Counties' Premier League club to win the championship three times in succession, and this has made us doubly committed to regaining the title in 2016. It is a really high standard of cricket; for half the season a young Australian by the name of Jake Doran was gracing our play and we are not alone in expecting him to represent his country beyond the U19 side which he has been captaining. Henley's own captain for ten very successful years, Bjorn Mordt, has now stood down and an exciting new era led by the younger players is beckoning.

The 2nd and 3rd teams maintained their positions in their respective Thames Valley leagues and we are hoping the 2nd's can push for promotion to the top league next season. The 4th team remains a vital component of the Club, enabling some of the mature players to help develop younger players coming through from the Junior Section, which itself has continued to develop. The U11 boys won their league, the U13 side won their Berkshire Cup competition which was a tremendous achievement, and the girls' teams also had a wonderful season, with the U13 girls winning a highly prestigious final. Junior coaching was full on, as was our development programme with local state schools, providing increased opportunities for these children to experience cricket.

Winter maintenance work is proceeding well on the grounds and will of course step up further as the new season approaches, so that we can continue to present them as a beautiful and quintessentially English sight. We had some issues with the pitch last season but our new groundsman has made an excellent start to restoring it to one of the best around; his name is Charlie and he has extensive experience including a long spell tending to the playing fields of Eton.

The spirit of the Club was epitomised by the 1st team having just won their league's fair play award, and we are looking forward hugely to the 2016 season and to maintaining our excellent relationship with our neighbours in Remenham Parish, to whom we wish a very Happy New Year.

THE WARRIOR AND THE MATHEMATICIAN - Part II VJ day Memories: Lt- Colonel John Sanderson and Sir Alex Oppenheim

August 15th 2015, the 70th anniversary of VJ day, was the day to remember two remarkable men who lived 150 yards from each other in Matson Drive, Remenham until the late 1990's. Lt-Colonel John Sanderson [died in 2001] and Professor Sir Alex Oppenheim [died 1997] both experienced the horror and barbarity of the Japanese military occupation of SE Asia [1941-1945].

Part I of this article - Lt-Colonel John Sanderson: The Warrior - was published in the last issue.

Professor Sir Alexander Oppenheim [Oppie]

The Mathematician Oppie became Professor of Mathematics at Raffles College, Singapore after a glittering academic career at Oxford, Chicago, Princeton and Edinburgh; he was revered by mathematicians specialising in number theory, for his formulation of 'The Oppenheim Conjecture'. His was a fateful decision to quit the 'mainstream' of mathematical research and accept the Raffles professorship in 1931.

Following the Japanese invasion of SE Asia, the capture of Singapore and surrender of the Allied troops in 1942, Oppie, as a member of the Singapore Voluntary Defence force, was put in the infamous Changi [Prisoner of War] POW camp and later forced to work on the Thai-Burma railway until 1945.

The code of the victorious Japanese Imperial Army had no concept of surrender; its brutal treatment of prisoners is well documented in memoirs and films. Conditions in the camps were harsh and almost unspeakable; inmates were constantly threatened and abused by their sadistic jailers. Many prisoners died.

Oppie rarely talked about his experience of the horrors of that time. But he survived. He told me once that he made shoes out of cut-up car tyres wired to his feet and he managed to persuade his captors that mathematics was a branch of medicine so he was directed to work in the camp sick-bay instead of being condemned to hard labour. However he knew that he had to find the resilience to cope with starvation and helpless incarceration with no prospect of escape to freedom. Boredom and hopelessness were sure killers; a way had to be found to lend purpose and fend off despair. Then 'the Angels Flapped their Wings'; Oppie 'got through' to Lieutenant Okazaki, a rare human-being amongst the jailers, who agreed to collect paper and books from the Raffles College library - enabling captive scholars to create a rudimentary POW university with Oppie as Dean and Professor of Mathematics.

'Out of the blue', a sketch of Oppie as a POW in the Changi camp was exhibited during an Antiques-Roadshow in 2011; it had been drawn by a fellow POW, John Mennie who in turn had given it to another POW Eric Jennings. Amazingly when Eric Jennings died in 1996, his family found the sketch, together with about 30 other drawings, in a shoe box. Perhaps the sketch shows another aspect of Oppie's resilient spirit by revealing his ability to concentrate and withdraw from surrounding hell into another world of rational mathematics.



After the war, Oppie became the last Colonial Vice Chancellor of the University of Malaysia, followed by

Mathematics at the University of Ghana and then head of the Department of Mathematics at the University of Benin, Nigeria.

Towards the end when Oppie was in his 90's, his visiting New Zealand Cousin Bill and I located the hidden key and found Oppie collapsed on the floor of his house in Matson Drive. He recovered after a few days in hospital commenting that the hospital had no pencils, so he had to solve the daily crossword by remembering the answers one by one; he could also play Scrabble [English across the board and French down]. In the 1920's he was Captain of the Oxford University Chess team. He was well versed in the supernatural works of the Eighteenth Century Romantic artist Henry Fuseli.
