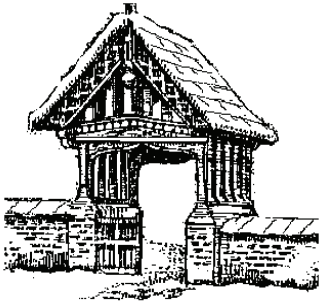
Whatever the results of these elections and referenda, the love of God will conquer, as it conquered the most gruesome outpouring of hatred and arrogance on Calvary.

Planting on Remenham Hill

Spring is around the corner and the RAG winter work should be very beautiful. The Borough Council has issued instructions that the verges may not be cut until summer, please ring me immediately if you see anyone trying to do so. (This applies to Aston Crescent as well.) Please also help us by discouraging the use of the verges. I know this has been controversial but the results should be worth it. Thank you.

Highways Initiative

Thank you for your help on this. It has not been dropped. I have been invited to sit on a very valuable initiative looking at traffic problems both sides of the river. I am still attempting to discover a consensus on the rat run and to create a team to generate some resident action for the bridge.

Neighbourhood Plan Questionnaire

Planning

There have been a number of planning applications during the last two months. In particular, there is one from Hobbs for some installations in the river, which our Council felt unable to support on grounds of safety on this narrow and very busy stretch of the river. We have also commented on a revised application for the long awaited redevelopment of the Thames Bridge House site, which poses some problems both as to design and also on the practicality of carrying out the works without huge disruption.

Licensing

The Henley Festival under its dynamic new managing director, Charlotte Geeves, has announced its programme. Together with your PC and WBC, it has revised its license to incorporate best practise on noise and to have a new activity on the car park next to the tents (furthest point from residents).

Telephone Box and Notice Boards

The proposal to refurbish the box and place it next to the hall to act as a notice board was abandoned. The parish council agreed to repair/replace the notice board by the Parish Hall and to review the need for the notice board by the Leander Carpark.

Wokingham Borough Council

I suspect that the European Referendum, Borough Council elections and the Wokingham Borough Conservative Group elections will tend to diminish any other initiatives.

DEALING WITH RUBBISH IN REMENHAM

The Neolithic Fly-Tipper

In the 1980's, when the trench for the N Sea gas pipe-line was being dug, a Neolithic rubbish pit was discovered about 700 metres SW of the Flower Pot pub in Aston. Fragments of pottery were found amongst the deposits; they are now in safe keeping in Reading Museum. One fragment shows the thumb print of the Neolithic potter who made it, may have used it and threw it away over 5000 years ago.[Ref Holgate and Start 1985, Berkshire Archaeology Journal BAJ 72, p 1-7].

Several millennia later in 1929, Aston again acquired a rubbish dump in the form of the ditch on the east side of Aston Lane. The minutes of the Remenham Parish Council meeting [including Colonel Burnell, Captain Noble and Major Hubert Victor Rhodes] at Park Place on 30th July 1929 reported that following the closure of the rubbish dump at the Remenham Club, the Aston Ditch would have to serve as a temporary dump. This was a public health issue that the military men were trained to handle. The Aston ditch was high priority on seven subsequent meetings until the 4th October 1932. Concern was intensified after receipt of a letter from Lord Hambleden's land agent Mr W J Holt-Beever complaining of the state of the ditch. Major Rhodes complained that rubbish from his house at Common Barn had not been collected for three weeks. A new contractor had to be found so tenders were sent out calling for collection and cartage. The tender from Mr A Butler [of Butler's field?] for £28 for 6 months was accepted including a charge of 3 shillings per load of soil and road sweepings plus a man to be employed to layer and tidy the ditch.

But worse followed. Rats had started to infest the bank and hedges of the ditch. The clerk of the Council was asked find out from the Wokingham Rural District Council how to deal with the plague. Poison gas was the answer. Messrs Hickman and Metcalf of Newbury were called on to demonstrate the efficiency of a gassing plant. The council directed the clerk to warn a careless householder that legal action would be taken if he did not remove a heap of old iron and discarded tin cans from the verge outside his premises. The clerk was asked on 26 July 1932 to purchase rat poison. The battle lines had been drawn.

Then all went quiet. When the minutes were signed off at the next meeting the rat poison instruction was crossed out followed by the insertion of 'cancelled'. The council had shown its teeth and pulled back. Other matters took precedence such as the state of the Horse Shoe footpath, the Parish well and the cow pats deposited outside St Nicholas' church lych gate and the rectory by the thirsty herd of cows on their daily trek the river. Perhaps there was something looming that no one could yet put a name to; perhaps this was the great economic slump and depression of the 1930's and the curse of unemployment even in Remenham.

However there is a hint of the crisis in the reports of the Rev S C Rees-Thomas [St Nicholas' Church] and the other trustees of The Remenham Non-ecclesiastical Charities that financial disbursements had risen from £9:15s [1929] to £30: 2s : 3d [1933] for food and hospital treatment.

The County and then District Council took over rubbish collection and the Aston Ditch was forgotten except by bottle collectors who realised the antique value of 50 years old Brakspear stone beer bottles and chemists' linctus and lotion glass bottles. [It is rumoured that the chalk/flint quarry above St Nicholas' church contains a large cache of discarded champagne bottles from many years of Regattas.]

How times have changed! Instead of being chivied and disciplined by the Parish Council, we parishioners now fear that we will increase global warming and shorten the life of the planet [including Remenham] if we are guilty of the deadly sin of sloth by not sorting our rubbish and putting it in the right box and bag.

A LITTLE BIT OF IRISH HISTORY IN REMENHAM

Following on from the tributes paid to the late Terry Wogan with his lovely soft Southern Irish accent, I am reminded of the little bit of Irish history here in our midst.

In the last turbulent years of the nineteenth century in Ireland with its bitter political divisions, Charles Stewart Parnell was the great National Irish leader. However, unbeknown for a decade, he was having an affair with Katherine O'Shea, wife of a certain Captain William O'Shea. Kitty (as she was called by her enemies) bore Parnell three children, eventually becoming Mrs Charles Parnell and I think the Captain came to a sticky end! When the affair became public, the brilliant career of Parnell was finished and he saw his career and reputation crumble. This was the scandal of Irish politics, as every Irish schoolboy knows.

Kitty O'Shea had a niece, Heaven Fitzgerald, the daughter of her sister. Heaven lived in 'Green Isle', a house close to Marsh Lock - it was her country home. She herself, I understand, was quite a character and there are some parishioners who still remember her.

Just after the war the house burnt down and was rebuilt under the rigid postwar regulations. It is soon to be rebuilt yet again, but with a more flexible approach by the planning officers.

I ask, is this Irish connection the reason why the house is called 'Green Isle'?

ANECDOTE TO 'THE WARRIOR AND THE MATHEMATICIAN'

(published in the November-December 2015 and January-February 2016 issues)

As mentioned in the last issue, Jim Bland had a response to Robin Sanderson's letter in the Times in August 2015 about the Retreat from Sangshak. It was from Maurice Bell (now aged 96), as follows:

"I was stumbling round this website (www.paradata.org.uk) when I came across something I will never forget – the message from 23 Div. telling us to leave Sangshak and come back to Imphal.

Poignant message telling recipients to fight their way out south then west of Sangshak area.

The battle had raged for five or six days and I knew from the messages we were sending to 23 Div that our position was becoming increasingly impossible and that there was absolutely no possibility of relief by friendly forces. We were on our own. As the Japs gradually pushed us back, the size of the "box" had been so reduced that it was difficult indeed to drop supplies. Most of the food, water and ammunition was landing in Jap held territory and our shortages were desperately serious. Personally, I had accepted that, sooner or later, we would be over run. But the priority was to delay the Japanese advance and thus allow the strengthening of defenses in Kohima, Imphal and the railhead depot at Dimapur. This included moving the Indian Army's 5th Division from the Arakan in the south to the Imphal area in the north. Every day we could delay the Jap advance onto those key objectives counted.

Because the Japs had, effectively, surrounded us our only link with 23 Div was by wireless and this was, to say the least, tenuous. The set itself was not powerful enough for the distance involved – about thirty miles "as the crow flies" - and we were using "sky wave", bouncing our transmission signals off an ionized layer (the Heaviside layer) which reflected them back to earth, hopefully in the region of Imphal. The altitude of the said Heaviside layer varied through the 24 hours and this required us, and 23 Div., to change frequency from time to time. This was a tricky operation. One lost contact and just hoped fervently that the theory would work and contact would be restored on the new frequency. Because of the low power of the set we were also using a directional aerial which had to be tied to a tree in the right position. Periodically, the tree or aerial were broken by mortar fire or shells and the aerial had to be repaired and re-tied. At about 5pm on the 26th March we lost contact and it was not until about 5.30 that we managed to restore service. Conditions were barely good enough for speech but our two experienced British operator were able to read the morse signals pretty well, in spite of the "static" interference so common in mountainous areas. I stayed on to make sure that all was OK and to give a hand on the manually operated "coffee grinder" that

generated electricity for the set. This machine was effective and reliable but tiring on the arms. Then it came. I could barely believe my ears (or the accuracy of my morse reading!) but the operator was writing what I thought I was hearing. Essentially the message said “pull out and come home”. A moment of bliss as there dawned the possibility – however slim - of a future life.

Then came the doubts. Firstly, was this a genuine message or something sent by the enemy? Secondly, had the Japs intercepted the message? We had destroyed our code books early in the battle to prevent them falling into Japanese hands and had been communicating “in clear” ever since.

On the first issue, we asked for information on personnel in Brigade Signals. This was personal stuff unlikely to be known by Japanese intelligence and included such details as the nick names of various signalers, including that of the CO. All the questions were answered promptly and correctly and we were reassured that the message was genuine.

On the second issue we could do nothing. I told the two operators to say nothing to anyone and took the message to Brigade HQ, wondering on the way how we would cope with the many wounded in the field “ambulance”. I explained to “Abbo” (Colonel Abbott, the Brigade second in command) the possibility that the message may have been intercepted by the enemy. What an opportunity for a major ambush! Action was speedy and troops began to leave the site as soon as darkness fell.

The suggestion of fighting our way out was discarded because we had very little to fight with and would, anyway, have been vastly outnumbered. Instead we were told to move quietly in small groups, avoiding roads and tracks which would very probably be controlled by the Japanese. Just in case the enemy were monitoring our radio link and would be alerted if it suddenly fell silent we kept it busy with “dummy” traffic as long as we possibly could. Then we destroyed the set, picked up our sten guns and joined the last stragglers leaving the site. I began badly by tripping and falling from the path we were on to one about 40 feet below where I bumped in to another group comprising a British sergeant from the Mountain Battery, three or four Gurkhas and a similar number of Indians, all strangers to each other. But that is another story!

Looking at the message now it is evident that the form was written at 23 Div. and presumably by two people – one giving the order (in block capitals) and the other adding a few words of comfort/encouragement. We had left several of our operators with 23 Div. to man the link to the Brigade and it is interesting to note that the message was transmitted by our Cpl. Monk who, some weeks later, was awarded the DCM for outstanding bravery in another operation.

Most of all, I see the message as the instrument that gave me and so many of my comrades the chance of further life! We were all young and had much to live for.

Thanks a million.
