



FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Friends

I wish to begin by thanking all those who have been serving, and all those who are currently serving, on our Church Councils in the benefice over the last year (and some for much longer!) and to commend them, and especially the Churchwardens of both parishes in the benefice, to your prayers. The Church Council is often seen as a rubber stamp for whatever the Rector wants to do, but I am delighted to say that that is far from the truth. Many who serve on the council bring with them not only experience from the outside world, but also a much greater knowledge of 'what's going on' in the parish and beyond than any priest can ever do. There is a place for 'worldly wisdom' in the Council and these two parishes can be proud of the unstinting service and effort made by those who represent them.

As I write the temperature is beginning to rise on all political fronts - at a local level, civil Councillors are vying for votes to get them back into the Council Chamber, former and prospective MP's are being seen in places in their constituencies that rarely get a visit other than at General Election time, and on the European front the negotiations leading to the UK's leaving the EU are, even at this early stage, producing rumour and counter-rumour. On the world stage one could be forgiven for thinking that temperatures are running dangerously high in the confrontation between the USA and North Korea; whilst in the Middle East the troubles continue.

One could be easily forgiven for joining that delightful lady from Bath (I think) who, when told that a General Election had been called, held up her hands in horror and simply exclaimed 'Oh no, Not another one!' I think my own exclamation might be 'Stop the world! I want to get off!'

We are certainly living in troubled, troublesome and uncertain times. But we Christians have to remember that, whatever things might look like, ultimately God is in charge. We must never think of that as being a sort of magic spell which makes sure that all will be well - that would be to deny us, the human race, the benefits of our free will, and would turn us into puppets of what could only be seen as a rather malevolent God. Our Christian belief must be that the God who loved the world so much that he sent his only Son to return creation back to its Creator has our best interests, our 'good' at heart. He may not be able or willing to stop mankind's foolishness, but he can still overcome that foolishness by love. 'God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoso believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life', the life of the risen Christ, shared with God, in love.

WARGRAVE FIRE STATION

Thank you for your support. We achieved the unachievable. A decision which was widely believed to have already been taken to close the fire station was amended to being deferred for one-year with two conditions – the availability of the crew increasing to 60 per cent and the savings being found elsewhere.

This obviously does not guarantee the future of the fire station but recognises the huge amount of achievement recently and gives a hope for future retention.

LITTER

We have agreed to employ Steve Allender to walk the footpaths and lanes and regularly pick up litter. I would be grateful if you could agree to him putting the litter collected with your own. He has special Adopt-a-street bags entitled to be collected with normal litter so it does not affect your allocation but they are picked up by the litter lorries as with normal garbage collections.

DOG BIN

As I informed you, the Parish Council on an experimental basis has agreed to put a dog bin near the Parish Notice Board and we will be emptying it during the experiment. If the experiment proves successful, the Parish Council will consider contracting and expanding the service. We have received the bin now.

VILLAGE CLEAN UP

Thank you all for turning up and giving a little of your time. With Bob Nancarrow, Franky Cookson, Alison Barraclough, John Merkel, Anthony West and me (I hope I have not missed anyone) we achieved a remarkable amount. If we can expand that next year......!



ADOPT A STREET

As mentioned, to attempt to keep the village clean, we would like to approach you to take responsibility for a small portion of the village near your property. The Council provides special bags so that any litter you pick up does not come from your quota for blue bags.

POLO PITCH

LICENSING AND EVENTS

The Public Protection service is becoming more remote. Without my knowledge, the subsidy to provide public toilets was unilaterally cancelled for HRR.by WBC. It has been restored and a promise of a review of licensing and events policy to be included. I hope to be able to retain this valuable service and I thank HRR and the Copas Partnership for providing it.

DEVELOPMENT

The Local Plan Update has slowed down in the wake of the General and local elections; the threat remains on the Ward.

COOPTIONS

The Parish council would be interested in hearing of any prospective councillors who would be happy to be co-opted. Elections for the Parish Council are May 2018.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN SURVEY

Although the Neighbourhood Plan itself has been overtaken by events and is no longer a necessity, the results of the Survey conducted during 2016 have now been professionally and independently analysed. An executive summary of the findings is shown on the opposite page, and the full analysis - which makes impressive reading - is on the website Home page.

REMENHAM NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - 2016 SURVEY ANALYSIS

Executive Summary

- There was a relatively low response rate of 18% from the 260 households and 40 businesses in the village; but with 55 respondents it was felt the data collected was still statistically representative.
- As a whole, the residents of Remenham are very satisfied with the current characteristics of the village
- The rural nature of the parish is valued extremely highly; with limited support for future development and growth, particularly commercial projects. There was some support to new buildings for family homes and/or first time buyers.
- The main area of concern centres on the amount of traffic in and travelling through the village. Litter was also an area where improvements could be made.
- On the whole the respondents agree that the events that dominate the Parish, attracting
 many visitors, are an important part of parish life; but increasing the number of events
 further could meet with resistance.
- Monitoring the impact of the Rewind Festival as a whole, would be advised.
- Monitoring the impact of ancillary commercial activities all these events bring would also be advised; the resultant traffic being the most highly cited problem.
- The biggest change the Parish Council could make is addressing the traffic congestion, particularly the use of the roads by commuters. A one-way system would need careful thought given some additional comments made. Speeding in Remenham Lane, and to some extent on White Hill, is also a significant concern.
- There is a mixed response regarding whether there is a need for additional public transport; further investigation is advised as to which constituents may benefit from such services.
- Protecting established footpaths and preserving rights of way should be a fundamental
 priority for the Parish Council. Monitoring the access to areas of private land previously
 open to the public, and impact of any restrictions, would be advised.
- The satisfaction of provision of utilities in the village is mixed. It would be worth
 looking further into whether a significant dissatisfaction with mains sewerage is due
 to poor provision or, perhaps more likely, lack of availability to certain areas. Highway
 maintenance and recycling, relevant to the whole village, also received the highest levels
 of dissatisfaction.
- There is a good level of amenities on offer in Remenham, with St Nicholas Church a significant focal point of the village.
- Police coverage is considered adequate throughout the year, reducing only slightly during events.
- The availability of leisure and sports clubs in the village is considered an outstanding feature of the parish.
- The availability of arts and culture in the village produced a more neutral response, but a low level of disagreement indicates that demand is insufficient in any case.
- Communication and availability of information about the parish is considered good.
- Overall, the survey results produce a very positive picture and reflect what would be considered as a very high quality of life for the residents of Remenham.

REMENHAM W.I.

March, including A.G.M.

Our President Judy Palmer stepped down after her 3 years, and Daphne Austen has taken over. We have a new member of the committee Irene Parker, in place of Judy Fraser who had to retire, as she may move away. We discussed the W.I. Resolutions to be voted on at the national A.G.M. in June. Just two have been selected, "Aleviating Loneliness" and Plastic Soup". These will be voted on at our May meeting. Our guest was Wendy Robinson who took us through the business part of the meeting. We started the afternoon with an excellent lunch of homemade soup, and savoury food and fruit; this was well attended and a very happy start to our A.G.M. After a healthy treasurer's report, Ann Francis told us of future plans which include an outing to The Sandham Chapel, painted by Stanley Spencer. This would be followed by a visit to the Needlework archive museum in Newbury. Details of the future programme for the year look excellent. And we are so fortunate to be able to hold our meetings in Remenham Parish Hall. In April we are holding a recruitment drive in Falaise Square, so we are full of hope women will come and see what we are about.

April

Mrs Daphne Austen, our new President opened the meeting, which sadly was rather bereft of members as Henley was almost closed because Hart Street was being dug up to repair the Sewer. After the usual business she reminded the members of future events, the Summer outing in July, the recruitment drive in Falaise Square on the morning of April 26th, and also the Thames Group meeting at Knowl Hill on the 11th May. After that she introduced Mr Steve Moll who gave us a year's tour of "The incredible world of the Honey Bee". He started by saying he was not a bee keeper until his neighbour asked him to help her catch a swarm in a box, which he introduced into a hive he happened to have. This was the start, and after 10 years he now has about 70 hives around the neighbourhood of Britwell-cum-Sotwell. He looks after the bees and his wife deals with the Honey and the candles. The hives have wire netting around them as they are at risk from Woodpeckers. Before Christmas the hives hum, and when opened the bees are all clustered together flapping their wings to keep the nursery area at 35 degrees. During the winter they will eat about 20 Kgs of sugar. In Spring the wooden frames in the hives are full of wax cells, all the same size and hexagon in shape. The wax is produced by the rear end of the bees, passed to their mouths and shaped. The Queen lays an egg in each, a spot of pollen is put in by the workers and sealed up and after 21 days they hatch out. In July the frames are, removed, the bees shaken off, the frames put in an extractor to remove the honey. The honey has an acidity to prevent bacterial growth, so is used medicinally and is used on wounds. In Summer on a good day the Queen flies out and mates with a drone on the wing, and a new swarm is formed with about 3,000 workers. So the cycle starts again. Sadly we have all heard about hives of bees dying: this is from a virus, but this can be held at bay with treatment twice a year. Irene Parker thanked Mr Moll for his fascinating talk and excellent slides and said no wonder the expression "Busy as a bee" is so relevant. After a guiz while the excellent tea was prepared by Carol Wissett and her helpers, the meeting closed.

May

The next meeting is on 8 May, with a talk on 'Swan Upping'.

REMENHAM THEN AND NOW

THE MINTY MEMORIAL ON FOOTPATH 8

The River Thames defines much of the Remenham Parish boundary flowing for about 5 miles in a horseshoe-shaped gorge cut into the chalk hills from Conways Bridge heading N under Henley bridge then NNE along the regatta reach past Temple Island, swinging E and SE through Hambleden Lock and then past Culham Court. In an arctic landscape this gorge is thought to have been carved out by torrential meltwaters 10 to 20 thousand years ago when the last Ice Age was losing its grip. The meltwaters had been forced to make this diversion when blocked by the 50 million year old Tertiary clay hills E of Twyford.

The result is the spectacular landscape of Remenham Parish we can now see when walking footpaths 8, 9 and 6 from Remenham Lane near the Little Angel pub to the Flower Pot pub in Aston. Apart from the absence of hedges which were torn out about 25 years ago, the views must be almost the same as in the 18th century; as you walk you can catch glimpses of the aristocratic buildings Remenham Lodge, Fawley Court, Temple Island and Greenlands and the ancient tower of St Nicholas Church. Alas, the majestic elm trees, infected by Dutch Elm disease, died over 30 years ago. (The remains of a colossal trunk may still be there on footpath 5 above Culham Court).

Evidence of the thousands of people who have passed this way is sparse. At Aston Rise, near the Flower Pot, a 6th century Anglo-Saxon skeleton surrounded by weapons and brooches was found; a few hundred yards away fragments of pottery (showing the thumb prints of the potter) were left in a Neolithic pit several thousand years ago; a 2nd century AD subject of the Roman Empire lost a silver coin (Emperor Trajan) in the Culham estate almost 1800 years ago: it was found again in the 20th century.

Still to be seen is the heartfelt Minty memorial, a stainless steel plaque set in a concrete base on footpath 8 just below Wilminster House, a few hundred yards from Remenham Lane.

To all who may pass the way Please let this tribute stand to the memory of MINTY,

These sentimental words capture the spirit of a delightful animal and its two owners proud of his loyalty and probably of his misdemeanours. It seems that his enthusiastic company could turn a trudge into a blissful walk towards the open landscape.

I first came across this memorial 15 or more years ago when it was embossed on stiff plastic sheet that had become cracked and worn. Later, while walking my dog Bessie, I came across a kneeling middle aged man replacing the plastic with the stainless steel plaque that you see now (see photo). He said "This is the second damn time I've done this. My first stainless steel plaque contained an embarrassing mistake caused by a misunderstand between my wife and the engraver". It read

Twyford Neighbourhood Policing Team Spring into Summer Update from PCSO Jackie Daniels

At last the lighter evenings and warmer weather are finally with us. As lovely as it is for spring/summer to be here it can bring with it an unwanted problem that effects the whole community - antisocial behaviour (ASB). Last summer we received a high number of ASB reports, particularly around the youth shelter in King Georges Field. We are aware of these issues and have been dealing with those involved however if you do see anything of this nature please report it to us on 101.

Theft from Motor Vehicles

We have seen a rise in thefts from motor vehicles in recent weeks and we would urge residents to report any suspicious activity to the neighbourhood team. If you believe there is a crime in progress, please call 999, otherwise please report it via the non-emergency number 101 to help with ongoing enquiries.

Please help to keep your vehicles safe by following the advice below:

- Always make sure you lock your car and close your windows even if you're away from your vehicle for just a few minutes
- Never leave your keys in the ignition while your vehicle is unattended opportunistic thieves will often steal cars that have been left with the engine running to defrost the windows
- Do not leave anything on display in your vehicle take all your valuables with you
- Never think leaving items in the boot is safe someone could have seen you put them
 in there

Parking

The team cover a very large area which includes 10 schools and we endeavor to patrol as many of these to make sure everyone is safe and parking legally. We have had numerous complaints regarding commuter parking in many residential roads in the vicinity of Twyford Train Station. As some of you may have seen, we have been issuing Fixed Penalty Notices in and around Station Road and Station Terrace. In just one day PCSO Jessica Howells issued 16 Fixed Penalty Notices. Wokingham Borough Council are now in the process of taking responsibility back for parking issues and this will be completed by the end of the year.

What the neighbourhood team have been doing

PC Chris Harrison has been the driving force behind three very successful speed/mobile phone/seatbelt enforcement days where the team have been joined by our colleagues from Wokingham & Crowthorne Neighbourhood Teams as well as Roads Policing Officers. In addition to numerous tickets issued for these offences, two vehicles were also seized for having no insurance and no tax.

On 1 March 2017 new legislation came into effect for those found using a handheld mobile phone while driving. Previously, this offence had attracted three penalty points and £100 fine. This has now increased to six points and £200 and newly qualified drivers will lose their licence if they are caught using a mobile phone behind the wheel.


