FATHER MARTYN'S SERMON - FROM HIS FINAL SERVICE IN THE BENEFICE ON 14 JANUARY 2018

'There are momentous events afoot' This was the comment of a broadcaster on the Today programme a couple of weeks ago, so he was not referring to today, thank heavens! But momentous events have a habit of burning themselves into our memories. Those of us who are old enough can almost certainly remember where we were when we heard that President Kennedy had been shot, or when we heard about the collapse of the Twin Towers in New York. Both of these events, and many like them throughout history have quite literally changed the course of world events.

Today's Gospel seems to have that same sense of the momentous. We are told the exact time when those two disciples of John the Baptist first met Jesus – it was at the tenth hour – in other words, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. That fact may seem to be trivial, but its inclusion hints at how important, how momentous it was for the disciples. Their lives were changed so much that they were able later to relate the exact place and time it all happened. Tantilizingly, typically some might say, the evangelist doesn't tell us the content of this encounter with Jesus which had so profound an effect on the pair. He doesn't tell us what Jesus said to them; he doesn't describe Jesus or where he was living. John simply says that they accepted his invitation to come and see, and that they stayed with Jesus for the rest of the day. Perhaps the conversation was too personal, or perhaps he felt that mere words couldn't convey the importance of their meeting, and the power of the presence of Jesus. But certainly the effect was profound – the two left John the Baptist and became Jesus' followers instead. And on top of that, Andrew wastes no time in going to find his brother Simon and to tell him that 'We have found the Messiah'.

Perhaps too the Gospel writer realised that an encounter such as this with Jesus, with the Lord, is a unique event and as such is something that each potential follower has to experience personally. It's not something that can happen at second-hand. Other people simply cannot express the feelings and the sense of purpose that the encounter engendered. The Lord issues an invitation, but it is up to each of us to respond – no one can do it for us. And in order for that response to be genuine we need to be in a state of readiness, open to hearing the Lord's call. The two disciples were already the disciples of John the Baptist, predisposed to the coming of the Messiah. And so, when they hear the call, they respond without hesitation. Speak Lord, your servant is listening, as we heard the child Samuel say in the Temple in the readings for the eucharist during this last week.

As Christians, we have all been called – that is part and parcel of being baptised. But more is needed – a real personal meeting with the Lord, not just what other people have told us.

Whether or not any of us can pinpoint an exact moment when we first came face to face with Jesus, we have to allow the Lord to change our lives irrevocably – only then will we be able to see as he sees, to act as he acts, to speak as he speaks.

The call to follow, the invitation to spend time with Christ, is never a once and for all experience. Just as the call to the priesthood of the church has be constantly renewed by prayer and study and sacrament, so for all of us we have to learn to recognise the voice of the Lord in our daily lives, just as the tiny child has to learn the voice of its parents. And this is not just occasionally – it's a daily occurrence. And whereas the teachings of the Church might well point us in the right direction, and keep us pointing in the right direction, Christ is able to speak to us through everyday events and people. After all, Peter himself was brought to the Lord by Andrew, his brother.

Recognising the Lord's voice and presence can be a gradual affair, just as discipleship is a lifelong commitment, not a one-off decision. Perhaps today the Lord is calling us most persistently in the faces of those who are in need, in the faces of the poor, those who are homeless, those who are victims of war or violence or oppression, those who are sick or dying, those who are lonely or unloved.

Open your eyes to see as the Lord sees. And in the months that will follow, make the face of the Lord known to those who desperately need to see him. And if you have caught a glimpse of God over the last few years, give thanks and pray that that experience, that one-to-one experience, can empower you to bring his love and his understanding into your life.

Every day is a momentous day in the life of the Church and of the Christian, a day to be remembered, to be cherished and from which to learn. So keep the faith, laugh a lot, maintain the unity of Christ's holy Church, even when that seems to be against the grain, or unpopular. And for God's sake never ever start to compare one Rector with another, or, heaven forfend, one Rector's wife (or husband) with another. Because all those 50 or so priests who have gone before me as Rectors of these parishes, have each, hopefully, opened the eyes of the people of this place to a different vision of the face of Christ, the Christ who left us two commandments which encapsulate all the others – the command to love, even when that's mighty difficult; and the command to be one. And never let the darkness of a lack of love or a disregard for the unity of the church or of the congregation, shade your vision of the Christ who was born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried and who rose again FOR YOU, who now lives in his Church in word and in Sacrament, and to whom with the Father and the Holy Spirit, be acclaimed all might, majesty, dominion and power, now and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

Irene Parker and Pat Sly are job sharing the secretary's job. The result of the vote for the Resolution to go forward to the National AGM in June is "Mental Health Matters". We urgently need your help with the petition against development on the Green Belt. Please go to the campaign website at www.cprwok.co.uk for the online petition link and more information. We need 1,500 signatures from residents urgently to generate a debate in full Council which will help to defeat this proposal. Please alert friends and neighbours too!

REMENHAM'S GREEN BELT IS UNDER THREAT. Wokingham Borough Council (WBC) is actively promoting development in the Green Belt in Wargrave and Ruscombe. You may think that this has nothing to do with Remenham. However, once the principle of changing the Green Belt for the Local Plan Update is accepted; the next, only four years hence, will make Remenham fair game.

HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

Much attention has been given to Highways and Flooding issues since the last newsletter including Sara Allman, WBC Highways, visited a well-attended Parish Meeting earlier this month to address issues raised and what could be done.

• Extending 30mph zone to Culham Cottages. It would not be normal to extend speed limits out of the settlement; WBC would obtain vehicle speed and number data near entrance to Middle Culham and in the 30mph section of the A4130. It was suggested that double white lines could help.

• 30 mph on Wargrave Road from the A4130 London Road junction down to Conways Bridge instead of the present 40 mph. There is contradictory 40mph/ SLOW sign near a bend on Wargrave Road.

COMMUNITY LITTER PICK

Highways could offer to improve this. WBC would obtain vehicle speed and number data

• Remenham Lane/Aston Lane/Remenham Church Lane. The issues are around the traffic signals on the bridge, event traffic, the rat run and the parking bays. Oxfordshire County Council control decisions on traffic light adjacent to Henley Bridge causing vehicle queues on White Hill and rat-runs as drivers tried to avoid the A4130 queues.

There was discussion about the legality of exporting traffic problems across a boundary. Traffic calming and weight/length/day/time restrictions would not be permitted, but there are many strategies which would be possible - white gates and 'unsuitable for HGV'. Event traffic orders should be reviewed. The parking bays could be moved, increased in width by negotiation with HRR and event restriction on parking monitored by traffic wardens.

- Flooding on Kentons Lane a works order has been raised. Flooding on Aston Lane needs a solution
- NOX levels measurement are being undertaken by the Parish clerk and more permanent solution is being undertaken. Measure the NOX levels and install sensors

REWIND

Rewind's new owners say they wish to have a strong relationship with the local community and residents. They are hosting a Local Resident Information Evening on Thursday 8th March, at Remenham Parish Hall at 7pm.

In addition to Rewind Festival 2018, Broadwick Live (the new owners) hope to produce a single day, 'picnic-style', orchestral, classical music event on Saturday 11th August. Whilst this event is wholly independent of Rewind Festival, the two events will work closely throughout the year, and it will be delivered by a number of people involved in Rewind festival to ensure consistency.

This information evening will be an opportunity for them to introduce their team, present their plans for Rewind Festival and answer any questions from the local community. It will also be an opportunity for them to provide further information about their plans for the classical orchestral event. ST NICHOLAS OF MYRA AND REMENHAM - AN ACCIDENTAL PILGRIMAGE

At the end of his sermon at Remenham on Sunday 3rd of December 2017, during the patronal service in St Nicholas Church , Fr Martyn Griffiths expressed mild regret that during his 13 years as priest of the benefice, he had not led a pilgrimage to Myra in Southern Turkey where the original St Nicholas (270AD to 343AD) had been Bishop about 1700 years ago.

Participants in such a pilgrimage would have learned that St Nicholas was the epitome of a universal saint who accumulated a host of legends and miracles. He inherited and gave away a small fortune gaining a reputation for generous donations of gifts; hence his identification with Santa Claus. He helped stricken shipwrecked sailors, rescued children from slavery, hurled bags of gold coins through the windows of young women deprived of dowries.

Although some of his miracles and acts may be legendary, St Nicholas did exist. There is one piece of authentic history. In 325AD St Nicholas of Myra and all other Bishops of the Eastern Church were ordered by the Roman Emperor Constantine to attend the Council of Nicaea near Constantinople. They were charged with suppressing the Arian heresy and agreeing the form of words describing the divinity of Christ. The results were summarized in the Nicean Creed which is one of the creeds used to this day in churches to express Christian faith.

Knowing this story you might say that Myra is a particularly suitable place for a 'St Nicholas' pilgrimage from Remenham.

If you read the guide books you will discover that Myra is in southern Turkey near the modern town of Demre. About 400 years before St Nicholas was born, the region was called Lycia comprising a league of small city states such as Xanthos, Patara and Olympus which were sometimes self governing but later dominated - in turn by the Persians, Greeks, Romans and Byzantines and from about 1453 the Islamic Ottomans. The coastal zone has two remarkable features, the submerged cities and the bas-relief temples carved on the vertiginous cliff faces. (The British Museum has a display of some of these striking temple carvings, the Nereids, which were hacked out and brought to England by Charles Fellows in 1838.) The ruins of the colossal granary of Emperor Hadrian can be seen on the way inland to Myra along the Sandrokos River where imported grain from Egypt was stored to feed the Roman legions.


As I dig out this tourist information, it dawns on me that I have a 'deja vu' familiarity with some of the details and then I realize that this is the very place that Jill, my late wife, and I visited around 40 years ago. Our visit was not meant to be a pilgrimage, far from it. Instead it was part of a sailing adventure with three other couples, all close friends, on a motorized 36 foot yacht. When we reached Myra we visited St Nicholas' Church. Surprised and deeply disappointing we found an empty shell, inside whitewashed and swept, outside a kitsch hunched statue of Santa Claus hoisting a sack of Christmas presents. It was in thoroughly bad taste, a Santa's Grotto and spiritually negative.

In the poem 'Church Going', Philip Larkin captured a similar emotion when visiting an empty church:-

When churches fall completely out of use
What shall we turn them into'...
And let the rest rent free to rain and sheep
Shall we avoid them as unlucky places?
And what remains when (even) disbelief has gone?
Grass weedy pavement brambles buttress sky.
A shape less recognizable each week
A purpose more obscure. I wonder who
Will be the very last to seek
This place for what it was....

In a similar way to reminiscences recorded in Proust's "A La Recherche du Temps Perdu", these thoughts triggered long buried memories of other incidents during that sailing adventure when we were relatively young and (temporarily!) our world seemed to be optimistic and peaceful. Fortunately two of our party were experienced yachtsmen; it was before the time of cosseted guided tours and we felt free to sail to otherwise inaccessible bays and islands as though we were returning from the Trojan war about 3000 years previously. The high points included windsurfing over the submerged city near Kekova viewing streets and beehive tombs through six feet of crystal clear water; clambering through the caves behind the bas-relief temples on the sheer cliffs; drinking sage tea with hospitable locals in a cliff-top cave furnished with discarded car seats; spending all day haggling and choosing Persian carpets in a Kas shop while drinking their gritty black coffee; going ashore on a tiny island covered in black dust and donkey droppings-- a manufacturing site for charcoal; being woken by a fierce squall caused by icy air tumbling down in the early hours from the nearby snow covered Taurus mountain range—when it was 'all hands on deck' to stop our yacht dragging its anchor and drifting towards the nearby rocks.

WOKINGHAM DISTRICT VETERAN TREE ASSOCIATION



Wokingham District Veteran Tree Association is a voluntary organisation that surveys and records veteran and notable trees across the borough as well as working as local Tree Wardens. Their objectives are to promote the protection and management of significant trees, to increase public awareness of the environmental and historical importance of these trees and to improve the environment through the care of trees in general.

The Association covers all the parishes and towns within Wokingham Borough and to date their survey has recorded and mapped over 7500 veteran and notable trees. In 2017 they celebrated their 10th Anniversary and published an Anniversary Report which includes a description of the notable trees in each of the seventeen towns and parishes as well as descriptions of their work and a summary of their findings to date.

The Woodland Trust have described WDVTA as 'a brilliant example of how local groups can make a real impact for projects like the ancient tree inventory'. Ted Green, a founding member of the Ancient Tree Forum promotes the enlightened view that ancient and veteran trees should be regarded as historic living monuments. He describes the Association as a unique organisation in the UK that is doing valuable work for the borough.

Alison Griffin chairman of WDVTA said "Surveying the veteran trees across the Borough has been a valuable activity. We have learned about our trees, history, land usage and biodiversity. Our data is used by residents and councils and has contributed to national records of significant trees. This is especially important at this time of unprecedented environmental pressure in Wokingham."

As well as the survey and Tree Warden activities WDVTA organises talks, training courses, walks and visits. The Association now has 240 members and welcomes more. Membership is free. Their survey of veteran trees has been completed in half of the parishes and towns of the Borough. WDVTA would also appreciate help to complete the remaining parishes and are looking for additional tree wardens across the borough.

PACT welcomes adopters from all backgrounds, including those of black and minority ethnic heritage and from the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community.

The charity holds regular adoption information events in Reading which are led by a social worker and include a talk from someone who has adopted through PACT.
