FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Remenham friends,

Many years ago I remember a mother getting onto a bus at Paddington Station. She had several children, and when the bus drove away from the stop, she realised that her youngest was not on the bus. I managed to get the driver to stop and allow us to disembark, and ran ahead of her – she being rather weighed down with children – back to the station to alert station staff and the police to the fact of a missing little boy, who was perhaps three years old. Happily, the boy had already been picked up by the police. They said that he had been very good, and hadn't cried at all. But when his mother appeared, he burst into floods of tears.

I think it is a common thing that when dealing with a crisis, whether in personal life or in the life of an organisation or the life of a nation, it is often when the immediate demands of the crisis are past that the impact is felt. When one is in the midst of a crisis, the only thing to do is to deal with it, usually by just keeping on keeping on, putting one foot in front of another. Sometimes of course it happens that someone breaks down under pressure – we all have our limits, and there is no shame in that – but on the whole the breakdown tends to be the exception. But once the pressure is off, when we have the space and time to think about what we have just been through, we might feel utterly exhausted, or angry and upset, or some combination of these things. Like that lost little boy reunited with his mother, it is when we begin to feel safe again that we are able to acknowledge how bad we have felt.

The fact that the Covid-19 pandemic has gone on as long as it has should not blind us to the fact that this has been a crisis, and a long and hard one at that. There are those who have really struggled at times, and many others who have been managing only by putting one foot in front of another. But I think we should be prepared for the possibility that now, as the worst danger appears to have past, and as we grow increasingly excited at the prospect of social life returning, it may be that the tiredness and the emotion starts to set in, at least once the initial euphoria of a return to normality has past. And I do think that we will need to learn to be patient and gentle with ourselves and each other in the days and weeks and months ahead.

As St Paul writes in his Epistle to the Ephesians, "Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice, and be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you."

REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL AND WOKINGHAM BOROUGH COUNCIL

Step 2 of Central Government's four-step plan to release England from lockdown went ahead on Monday 12th April. Fortunately, there were just 8 new Covid-19 cases and thankfully zero covid-related deaths for the period 10-16th April were reported for Wokingham area yesterday (26th April). As the weather warms and the chains of lockdown are gradually eased, we should never forget those who have suffered directly or indirectly from this virus locally, nationally and internationally.

Most summer events are planning to go ahead albeit in a different form and at a different date. The full details will emerge as we come nearer to the time. The Festival is having a new one off event when HRR usually is held. All these events will be subject to whatever Covid rules exist at the time and will be reviewed to ensure that they are cancellable at short notice. However, all looks good at the time of writing with the UK's superb vaccination programme locking in a low Covid incidence throughout the country and in particular here.

It is inevitable that visitors to Remenham will increase as summer holidays abroad still look uncertain. I ask everyone to help in ensuring that the village is kept clean. I will be looking to the Borough Council to be dynamically reactive to any pressures and I would ask you to ring me up whenever you have any issues.

You should all have two new recycling bags, food waste bags and blue bags. We are not intending to be officious about the use of the new recycling bags. Please continue to use black boxes if it is convenient or use them to house the recycling bags, but please always put paper in the recycling bags and cardboard if you can. The dustmen will pick up large cardboard but please put this out in the early morning of a pickup when dry. I have a stock of blue bags, recycling bags, food waste bags and adopt a street bags for your use.

Matters discussed at the Parish Council in March (8th) and April (12th) included:

Eight planning matters and applications, where professional advice of Pegasus was sought.

CIL expenditure on the following 4 projects:

- Tegular paving outside the Parish Hall entrance and lane drainage
- Westcotec speed indication signs on White Hill (A4130)
- Parish ecological-biodiversity survey and wild trail work in the Wargrave Road
- Parking controls, slipway repair and large litter bin(s) in Ferry Lane, Aston

In the 4th project (previous page) Aston residents through Bill Ronald said they wished to see 2.5m logs placed on verges up to 100m from the slipway, 2 large litter bins placed near the slipway, repairs to the slipway and suitable signs. Agreement was reached in principle with Culden Faw, a contractor and a litter bin provider, but it appears WBC Highways would prefer to see 2h parking restrictions introduced. Simon Price (WBC) spoke on the matters at April's meeting and is organising a virtual meeting with Cllrs, residents and WBC Highways/Planning/Property (which was to have been today (27th) – but is now delayed until next week). This meeting will also consider signage at Culham Lane and near The Flower Pot. Please indicate if you would like an invitation to this forthcoming meeting.

Three licence applications: Henley Rowing Club, UTRC and Henley Festival (two events in July and Aug with in one case 8000 attendees). In the UTRC application for a pop-up café downstream of their boathouse, RPC suggested 4 conditions that UTRC is happy to meet. In all responses, RPC has requested that decision makers ensure residents and attendees remain covid-safe. Please indicate to The Clerk if you would like to see any RPC responses. RPC will object to any towpath/footpath closures/diversions during these events. RPC have agreed to seek legal advice on licences from Sarah Glover.

Highways: On 2h parking bays in Remenham Lane the Parish Council will in Sept 2021 consider whether the second bay should be re-introduced (and where).

Footpaths: It is suggested that the Parish Council should take the initiative to remove rubbish from footpaths. The towpath signs will be suitably treated at the time new bins are installed in Ferry Lane, Aston. Green paint has been received from the supplier to repaint the larger dog-waste bin near the Parish Hall in a more rural colour.

Financial matters: The Parish Council reserves are higher than expected because CIL expenditure has been delayed by WBC approvals. SSE is in the process of raising the price of electricity for three streetlights from £220/year to £1200/year. There is likely to be discussion in the near future about whether this is value for money and what are the safety implications of any decisions.

At the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) on 12th April (7:00pm) notes from the most recent APM (2019) were circulated and RPC's current financial position was summarised (namely that the current account balance (about £73,000 in March 2020) had risen because of hindrance of CIL expenditure (to almost £110,000 in March 2021)).

If you have been left out in any way and/or need help, please contact me or Paul Sermon (the Parish Clerk) or any other Parish councillor - we shall be able to help.

The Henley Society

Dear Fellow Resident.

I write as Chairman of The Henley Society, founded almost 60 years ago, to draw your attention to our work on behalf of those, like yourself, who live in, or near, our vibrant and beautiful town and enjoy the many amenities it provides. I very much hope to be able to engage your interest in our Society by outlining its aims, organisation and activities, and to explain why we are seeking to recruit more Members.

Our Aims: The Society is a registered Charity with a lengthy and impressive constitution, but its aims for Henley can be simply summed up. They are to promote high standards of planning and architecture, to protect, improve or develop, as appropriate, features of historic or public interest and to do the same for environmental issues.

Our Organisation: We have an Executive Committee which meets monthly and deals with general matters. The Executive Committee has nine members plus a representative from Henley Town Council and is supported by our President, HRH The Duke of Kent, and three Vice Presidents, The Lord Camoys, The Baroness Buscombe of Goring and Sir Martyn Arbib. Our Planning Sub Committee which vets and comments on around 300 planning Applications each year, before they go to Henley Town Council, and the planning authority South Oxfordshire District Council, prior to determination. The Planning Committee has five members. Our arrangement with the Planning Committees of Henley Town Council and SODC has been in place for our entire history. We also have a small Committee considering special activities for 2022 when we celebrate our 60th birthday. Outside of Covid restrictions we also organize talks, lectures and outings to places of interest to Members, and we keep Membership informed of all activities through our Executive Committee Briefing, usually monthly by email.

Our activities: It was a campaign by Henley residents which originally brought the Society into being. In 1961 a developer sought to demolish the Catherine Wheel Hotel and to build a row of shops in its place. The then Henley Borough Council did not object but Oxfordshire County Council opposed the application and local residents thought that they were entitled to a say too. Leaflets were designed, printed and distributed, and a public meeting was called at which there was unanimous opposition to the planned development and support for the County Council's stand. The developer appealed and there was a Public Inquiry at which the Inspector upheld the decision. The Catherine Wheel was saved and the Henley Society was formed shortly afterwards.

Since that heady success our activities have been widespread. There have been many achievements and, inevitably, occasions when our views have not prevailed. We have objected to brash shop fronts, plastic canopies, hanging signs, posters and A-Boards, and have regularly lobbied both the Town, District and County Councils on such matters as street cleaning, the condition of lavatories in our main car parks, street lighting, and parking and traffic issues. We were involved some years ago in ensuring the Town Hall roof was appropriately restored and in the saving of the Kenton Theatre.

We are tree conscious and have been responsible for plantings in the two main car parks, Gravel, Hill, Greys Road and along the Fair Mile among other sites. We took a major part in the campaign for a riverside walk. It took 21 years and a lot of money in Solicitors fees, but it is there now for all to enjoy. Our 2019 campaign to restore 19 Victorian terrace house signs was also successful.

Our Current Campaigns: We are currently backing the local campaign to discourage HGVs from using Henley as a rat-run, pushing for the re-instatement of the Friday Street public slipway and have recently lobbied to have garden areas reinstated at Gravel Hill and Reading Road. We are in discussion with Henley Town Council regarding the installation of solar-powered compactor waste bins and a trial of two of them is expected to begin in April 2021 with one sited outside Starbucks and the other at Singers Park. We are also talking to the Town Council on a collaborative restoration of the Phillimore Fountain, and pushing to have the hand-rail adjacent to the steep steps from the church path to the Red Lion forecourt repaired.

Our Membership: We have around 270 members. This is a respectable number but must be a small proportion of the number of people who care about Henley and about decisions which affect the quality of the town as a place to live, work and play, now and in the future

Our subscriptions, unchanged since 1993, are £5 per annum, or £8 for a couple living at the same address, and £50 for Life membership (£80 for a couple living at the same address.)

We welcome your views on issues that are important to you, and your support, if you approve, on our stand on any given matter. We cannot hope to please all members all of the time but there is generally a consensus of views among members who make their views known to us.

If you would like to join us – and our voice is only as strong as the number of our Members- then please complete the attached form and return it to me. I look forward to hearing from you.


