FROM THE RECTORY

Dear friends,

This year was a particularly joyful Christmas: after the years of lockdowns, social distancing, anxiety, cancelled services, and depressed numbers, we were at last able to do Christmas properly once again. Numbers were pretty consistently up at Christmas services both here at St Nicholas Remenham and also at St Mary's over the river. There were times during the Covid pandemic when I wondered if this would be the thing that would kill off Christmas church attendance: it is very pleasing to see that it isn't so.

You will be appalled to hear that it is not unknown for the clergy of the Church of England, and even some of the laypeople, to grumble at Christmas time. "Where are they the rest of the year?" is occasionally harrumphed over the Christmas port. Now don't get me wrong, of course I would be delighted if you who came to church at Christmas were to decide to start coming every Sunday, to volunteer for the flower rota, to stand for the PCC, to revive the choir or start a new Sunday school. We all have our dreams! But if the choice is between having you with us at Christmas, or not having you with us at all ever, I would take the former every time. A full church is a delight whenever it happens, and I would rather have that delight once or twice in a year than not at all.

And this actually expresses something really quite essential about the Church of England, at least as it is currently constituted. The basic unit of the Church of England is the parish. Everyone in England lives in one. And the basic unit of each parish is the parishioner. Anyone who lives within the boundaries of the ecclesiastical parish is a parishioner and has rights in their parish church, whether or not they regularly attend worship. Those of you who come to church at Christmas understand this instinctively: it is your church, it is there for you. You don't have to buy a subscription or jump through hoops or hold a qualification to attend. And more than that, if you live within the parish of St Nicholas Remenham, you have certain specific legal rights in the parish church when it comes to baptism, marriage and burial. You can also participate in the Annual Meeting of Parishioners if you wish to. If, for example, Richard Dawkins or the Ayatollah lived in Remenham parish, they would still have rights in the parish church, irrespective of their religious commitment or lack thereof.

For me this is something important. When Jesus encounters people in the bible, it is only very rarely that He quizzes them about religious matters. He doesn't, for example, ask them how often they go to the synagogue or temple. Instead, He responds with simple compassion to their needs. The ethos of the Church of England parish system is, it seems to me, related to Jesus' approach. It is inclusive, in the basic sense of the word: you are assumed to be "in" by default.

So I look forward to seeing many of you again next Christmas, and of course I'd be delighted to see you in-between-times too. And don't forget that your parish church is just that: we are here for baptisms, weddings, funerals and more, and if you need something from the church please get in touch and we will do our best to help.

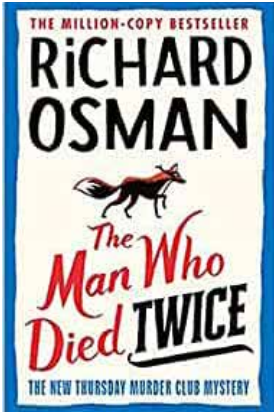
November

NOTES FROM REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL

January 2023



A very Happy New Year to all from me and my fellow Councillors. We enter 2023 probably overfed, overwatered yet raring to go on your behalf!

Life in Remenham is somewhat damp and dark as I write but the optimist in me says Spring is around the corner and we will see our lovely Parish burst back into life ready to soak up the sunshine.

We have continued to be active on your behalf in recent Council meetings pressing to have a positive impact on behalf of all.

On Licensing we now have agreed that a task force of John Halsall and Neil Brown, together with King's Counsel will develop the project to influence the Wokingham Licensing Policy. This policy is currently under review and we want to be sure in its new form that it requires considerate and professional management of events such as Rewind Festival to lessen negative impacts on Parishioners.

We received a presentation from the Wokingham Council anti social behaviour leader. This highlighted the support available to report issues such as fly tipping and to resolve neighbourhood disputes on issues such as noise nuisance and inconsiderate bonfires. The Wokingham website allows these and other issues to be reported and the team are happy to support constructive resolutions.

Believe it or not the paving area in front of the Parish Hall is now with Planning and hopefully will receive approval to permit the long awaited installation in March or April.

Good progress has been made on the Nature trail along the Wargrave road and a first clearance of a path has been started. Do take a stroll to inspect this but mudproof footwear is advised.

Yesterday evening we also welcomed the Chief Executive of Wokingham Citizens Advice service to our meeting. We learned of the many areas where Parishioners can benefit from guidance. I would recommend a visit to their website. The service is always in need of volunteers, so food for thought?

We continue to press Gigaclear for information on their installation plans and have so far been disappointed with their lack of response. We won't give up so hopefully more news soon.

We are planning a community litter pick morning on Saturday 25th March. The plan is to provide hi viz vests, sacks and litter picking tools from the Parish Hall at 9.30 am. All participants are welcome and with your equipment you can then choose an area near your home. This is a fun way for anyone who wants to contribute to keeping the Parish pristine to get involved. There will even be tea, coffee and a slice of cake at the Parish Hall for the hard workers at 11am....so not too demanding a morning.

As predicted, the weather is washing the mid section of Aston Lane away so we continue to push Highways for repairs. A number of issues have also been raised via parishioner inputs on White Hill which will be raised at our planned February Highways meeting. New speed signs will be installed shortly on White Hill.

Nobody said it was easy to get things done.....but your councillors are determined to persevere. Please keep in touch and let us know what else matters to you.

MICHAEL WILLIAMS OBE

(extract from the Henley Standard of 6 January 2023, with corrections!)

Mr Williams, 71, a retired banker from Remenham, was honoured with an OBE in his Majesty's New Years Honours for helping to rescue British Rowing from financial problems. He said he was "delighted" to be recognised.

Mr Williams said: "I worked for many years as an unpaid volunteer. Quite rightly so, successful athletes and Olympians are recognised for their services to sport but it's quite nice now that the army of volunteers who administer and organise the sport are being recognised as well."

Mr Williams was born in Oxford and went to Oundle School in Northamptonshire, where he first came across rowing. After being identified by a peer as the smallest new boy, he coxed the school's eight which qualified for Henley Royal Regatta in 1967. He studied maths and economics at Trinity Hall, Cambridge, and continued coxing, competing at Henley every year from 1971 to 1973.

Mr Williams said: "I was never going to be a fantastic rower because of my size but I do remember my first race steering an eight. I remember the sensation of speed, even though we probably weren't going very quickly, and that was fun. Once you are bitten by that bug, it never leaves you."

When he started work in the City, he joined London Rowing Club and was treasurer for about 10 years. In 1989, he was appointed to the board of the former Amateur Rowing Association, now known as British Rowing, after being invited by the late Peter Coni, a former chairman of Henley Royal Regatta. He spent the first half of his 25 years as Treasurer and the second half as Chair of the Finance Committee, fixing the association's finances before leaving in 2014.

Mr Williams said: "When I took over, we were in a weak financial position. When I left, we were not only the strongest nation in terms of performance but we were also in a strong financial position. During my time, we acquired the headquarters in Hammersmith and later doubled it in size and acquired the Caversham training centre. We now have substantial assets."

Mr Williams was appointed a Steward of Henley Regatta in 1993 and was a member of the Management Committee from 1997 to 2019. He was also an umpire, receiving his multi-lane licence in 1994 and his FISA licence three years later. From 1999 to 2015 he umpired at Henley. His final race was the 2015 final of the Grand Challenge Cup between the Great Britain and German eights, which the former won by almost three lengths.

A TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE

I have had the privilege of seeing the correspondence summarised below, a wonderful example of the power of literary correspondence that we are shortly celebrating with our 'Letters Evenings', and, as Sue Laing says, 'We love a little bit of history in Remenham'. [Editor](#)

From an email to Henley Archaeological & Historical Group from Peter Kastor, History Professor in the US, asking for help in locating a property:

'My family periodically stayed in Henley during the 1960s and 1970s, both before I was born and when I was young. My grandmother had friends in Henley, , a town we all came to love. We usually rented a house behind the Little Angel, immediately adjacent to the cricket field.

My parents both died recently, and as the historian in the family, I have become the caretaker of their photographs. These include many from our time in England. I have been trying to reconstruct those trips, and that includes locating the house where we stayed. It was an interesting combination of two structures: a modern single-storey home that was likely built in the 1950s or 1960s, and an old barn most likely from the 17th century.



I'm attaching a few photos of the house and barn. The older man in one of the photos is my grandfather, a Princeton University professor of English literature. The little boy in the photo is me from a trip to Henley in 1969.'



Reply from Sue Laing, David Feary from HA&HG having located Home Farm:

'You have the right house. We bought Home Farm in 2008 and have completely rebuilt it, but keeping all the old beams etc! The old farm door is still there - it is now a dummy door but we wanted to keep it for old time's sake! The house was split into two when we arrived but we knocked it back together again. The previous owners had the house for over 60 years.

The little bit of history that we've found is that originally all the land (the cricket pitch and what is now Butlers field, owned by the Regatta) was part of the farm which was the Home Farm for Fawley Court over the river. We believe the oldest part of the house is 1760.'



And the delightful response from Professor Kastor:

'I'm especially grateful to you for the recent history of Home Farm. The more I think about it, the more I realize just how much those vacations to Henley meant to my family. I travelled there with my parents, my two older sisters, and my paternal grandparents. We stayed in Henley for four summers. I only remember the 1977 trip, but I recall it as a truly magical experience. My grandfather was particularly happy to find Home Farm. An English literature scholar who studied the stagecraft of Shakespeare's England, he set up shop in the barn so he could write about the seventeenth century in a historic space. I returned to Henley with my grandparents in 1984 and again on my honeymoon in 1999.'
