

FROM THE RECTORY

Dear Remenham friends,

Now that we've got to the other side of Holy Week and Easter, the great celebrations of Ascension and Pentecost are around the corner, but the clergy of the Established Church also have to seriously turn their minds towards the Coronation. I hope to see many of you at Matins on Sunday 7th May at 11.15am, and if not there then at the picnic at the Parish Hall afterwards!

I didn't grow up in the Church of England, and my upbringing was to a very large extent republican and socialist; my maternal grandfather in particular represented that strand of the British labour movement that "owed more to Methodism than to Marx". And so although I myself am not a republican, I can't help but feel a little irony in the involvement of this grandson of a republican socialist non-conformist Liverpudlian in coronation celebrations of royalty in the Royal County of Berkshire!

And so naturally enough I was reading the Guardian last week, and I came across a rather ferocious opinion piece pouring scorn on the forthcoming Coronation ceremony in general, and the Church of England's role in it in particular. For me it was rather sad to read, both because of the crudeness of the argument, which seems to increasingly be a feature of politics across the board in these polarised times, but also because the writer really didn't appear to understand anything very much about the Christian faith.

Even if you think about it from the purely secular perspective of the history of ideas, it's not hard to see that the story of Jesus of Nazareth has had an enormous impact on politics and leadership across the western world. Nowadays Christianity is almost exclusively associated in most people's minds with the politics of the right, but liberal and radical politics in the west and I think perhaps especially in the English-speaking world have a substantial debt, these days largely unacknowledged, to the Christian faith.

During Holy Week we celebrated the life of a man who, from a Roman point-of-view, was a trouble-making member of a despised ethno-religious group; and who from the point-of-view of the religious leadership of the time was an upstart working-class northerner. And not only did we celebrate his life, but we also proclaimed his death, asserting that in his being "lifted up" on the cross he revealed his "glory". This broken, beaten man, who died the death of a slave, we proclaim as King of the Universe.

So whilst Karl Marx prophesied the "Dictatorship of the Proletariat", the gospel proclaims something altogether more radical than simply switching the feet in the jackboots from one social group to another: through the cross of Jesus, every idea of kingship, rule, authority and power is turned upside-down.

Jesus described himself as one who came "not to be served but to serve", and as the Good Shepherd who "lays down his life for the sheep". On the eve of his arrest he washed his

disciples' feet, even the feet of his betrayer. For Christians, this is the true measure of leadership and authority, and this is the one to whom all who hold authority will ultimately be called to account. So my hope and my prayer is that, through the ceremonies of the Coronation, our nation, and especially those who hold positions of responsibility in Church and State, would recognise afresh the radical challenge of Jesus of Nazareth, and that the King and all who serve in public office in this land would be filled with a true spirit of service and sacrifice.

PARISHIONERS OF THE PAST- PART II

As reported in the last issue, Paul Cook has transcribed some reminiscences from the late Rev. Pettit. The first half was published in the last issue and this is the second. Editor

"I have recorded in past Remenham magazines my good fortune in the four churchwardens I had during my long stay in Remenham.

When I came in October 1949, Mr Kingsley Jeakes and Colonel Burnell were the church wardens. Kingsley with his characteristic modesty wanted to resign from the position of Rector's warden on my appointment. I knew a good man when I saw one, and I hastened to point out that he could not possibly leave me in the lurch from October to the next Easter, hoping that by that time he would have liked me sufficiently to continue.

And so it was, and he was my warden right up until 1965 when he really felt it was time for a change. Kingsley had been a most distinguished air pilot in the last part of the 1st world war. Retiring with the title of Squadron Leader, he clearly would have risen to very great heights if he had stayed on in the service. But characteristically, all that time, he mentioned not a word. All I remember of his flying days is of seeing him as a very handsome young man in uniform. Then too he was a talented and gifted artist, but again you were only likely to know by chance or if you had a glimpse of his paintings. But with this modesty there was great service. If anything needed to be done or any cause needed support, Kingsley could always be counted upon.

Colonel Burnell, my people's warden was a man of great note in the county of Berkshire and beyond. He had a commanding presence and a powerful personality. I remember at a Leander Dinner hearing two very distinguished oarsmen indeed talking of the Colonel in his younger days with some awe, tinged with admiration. Yet I often smile to recollect a delicate afternoon I had visiting the colonel. He had for many years read both lessons in church. I wanted to diversify and enrol others to take part so I had to tell him that I wished to take a lesson from him to give to others. He took it so understandingly but greeted Mrs Burnell with the words "I'm sacked!" as she came downstairs to give us tea. But still I have the feeling that as far as reading the lessons were concerned, he was the professional whereas the others newly enrolled were mere amateurs.

We sometimes say of the great ones of the past "There were giants in those days." It was Colonel Burnell who was the giant of our past, and behind this giant was his gentle, lovable yet shrewd wife, Mrs Burnell, one of the nicest persons who ever lived.

And last of all there was Heaven herself living on Green Isle. What a good sport she was – and so talented as an actress. When I first met her I thought that she was not the observant sort of person at all. What a mistake that was. Her one woman show in her younger days when she gave character sketches on the lines of Ruth Draper, displayed her sharp study

of womanhood with a pretty wit to exhibit absurdities and a great sense of humour quite without malice.

Her world came apart when her beloved Maurice died. I do not recall her giving any recitals after that, but yet she put her world back with characteristic courage.

I should like to recall just one personal memory. I was preaching a sermon on the vocation to the priesthood and used a quotation from Jane Austen's Mansfield Park. In this Miss Crawford's made to say, "I am just as surprised now as I was at first that you should intend to take holy orders. You really are fit for something better. Come change your mind. It is not too late, go into Law."

I looked up from the pulpit, and there were Heaven and Maurice (who was a most distinguished lawyer) holding hands and laughing, whilst enjoying the joke together. But Heaven, truly was a good sincere and thoughtful Christian with a kindness which showed itself in her life and personality.

All I have written about, apart from Colonel Burnell, lived in the parish. But beside these there were non-residents on the PCC, all splendid Christians. One was Miss Rowe who lived at Grenville Lodge on the Fairmile, an enthusiastic Christian, who to my regret, left soon after my coming, to live in the Cotswolds.

Also there were two people who were worth their weight in gold. Mr Fred Rogers and Miss Sybil Reeves lived near each other in St Marks Road, Henley. Fred had been organist in Remenham church since he had been a small boy and had grown into a most talented musician and conductor. For about twelve years we had a splendid partnership and this inspired many moving and unforgettable services in our church. He formed of course, the Remenham Singers which though not a choir from the parish, sang all their principal performances in the church. It is a delight to be able to record that in all that time we had not a single cross word nor any radical difference of opinion.

Miss Reeves served as Honorary Secretary to the choir but Sybil was for more than this, ready with efficiency and goodwill to tackle any job that might arise. And as I say, they were a wonderful asset to my church.

Besides all these there was one notable absentee from the PCC and for a good reason. He was Mr John Cridlan of Remenham Farm, and I remember how tremendously impressed I was then, as I still am, to learn he was on the other side of the world (in Australia or Argentina if my memory serves me correctly) as an international judge of Aberdeen Angus cattle.

You may think that I have looked at all these my friends with rose coloured spectacles. I can only reply that I wrote as I saw. "

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
