FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Remenham friends,

I sit down to start writing this letter on the feast of Ss Simon and Jude (28th October) – St Jude being the Patron Saint of Lost Causes. There are several theories has to how St Jude came to acquire this very particular patronage; probably the most plausible theory is that because so little is known of him, and because he also happens to share the name of Judas (as in Judas Iscariot), he was usually the very last saint anyone thought of calling on when they were in trouble. In other words, once you'd gone through appealing to the intercessions of the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Joseph, and all the usual favourite saints, and you still found yourself in trouble, St Jude was always the very last resort, the saint that only the hopeless and despairing would ever invoke.

We may be forgiven for feeling in these days that humanity has in some general way reached the point of needing to invoke the intercession of St Jude. Whether it be the increasingly gloomy news on the speed of climate change, and the slowness of efforts to tackle it, or the tragic conflict unfolding once again in Israel and the Palestinian territories, or the ongoing war in Ukraine, or fears for the consequences of AI, it's not a great time for optimists.

One of the special things about what I do is the sense of perspective that it brings.


In purely human terms, standing as I do at the altar at St Nicholas Remenham, knowing that I stand in the same place where my predecessors have stood to celebrate the Holy Eucharist for the past 1000 years, give or take; knowing that Vikings and Normans, the Black Death and the Civil War, Louise XIV, Napolean and two world wars, have all come and gone: this is something that I find both humbling and encouraging.

Looking at it from a spiritual perspective, the sacrament that has been celebrated through all those years on that spot in broken bread and wine outpoured is a sign of God's loving purposes for the world: a sign that God loves the world enough to be a part of it and to be subject to it, embracing even its brokenness and despair. In the stained glass above the altar we see the Cross from which Jesus cried "My God my God why have you forsaken me?", and we see that even in the deepest gloom or hopelessness we are not separated from the love of God in Christ Jesus.

NOTES FROM REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL



November 2023

Well that's it. No more Summer and welcome to long nights and Storm Ciaran! The leaves are showing their Autumnal hues and preparing to descend in their millions. At least our water supplies are happily topped up and as we reach out to turn up our home thermostats our energy costs are (only marginally) more affordable than this time last year. So every storm......

Since I last wrote we have been able to lock away lovely memories of a warm September

afternoon when Parishioners turned out in droves to enjoy the community spirit at this year's Remenham Fayre. Ropes were tugged, rats were splatted, cakes were baked and consumed by three or even four generations of Remenham residents. Thanks again to Janette Brown's Fayre committee and many helpers who made the event such a success. If we ever need reminded how lucky we all are to call this Parish our home. The Fayre does the job.

Let's continue on another positive note. At last, Gigaclear have delivered their much extolled superfast internet to many of our homes. Anecdotally, the implementation was very professional and most people I have spoken to are delighted with their new service. With, I promise, no commission in the offing to yours truly, if anyone has been humming and hawing about changing, I would urge you to look at their website and make a decision.

At our September meeting we had guests representing Rewind South and Wokingham Licensing who discussed this year's Rewind event with RPC and residents. It was agreed some progress had been made by the event's management but also it was agreed that further improvements could be delivered on communication impacting traffic management at the event. These points were taken as actions by the management company and will be reviewed prior to any Festival next year.

Two posts for installation of RPC funded defibrillators have been purchased to allow installations opposite Temple Island and near Hambleden lock.

At our October meeting we were joined by our local community support Police officer. We were pleased to hear that Remenham Parish remained a low incidence region for police related issues. Parishioners were encouraged to use the 101 number to report concerns relating to any antisocial behaviour and reserve the 999 number for any suspected crimes in real time.

On a separate topic it was agreed that we need to seek a face to face meeting with Wokingham Highways team to address a number of outstanding actions on matters such as poor road markings, obstructed pavements and lines of sight at junctions where vegetation has blocked driver's views.

Perhaps it is time to pause and put another log on the fire as we settle in for the chillier season.

A delicious tea and chatter ended the meeting.



The British Legion Poppy Appeal began on 26 October and continues until Remembrance Sunday, 12 November 2023. All donations raised during the Poppy Appeal help the Royal British Legion to provide life-long support to serving and ex-serving members of the British Armed Forces, their families and dependants through hardships, injuries and bereavements.

In Remenham, red metal 2023 poppy pins, new this year paper poppies, self-adhesive poppies, pin-on poppies 15cm (6") wooden poppy crosses and vehicle poppies as well as reflective clip on poppies (e.g. for a dog collar?) may be obtained from Whitehill Petrol Station, Whitehill Workshop, Henley Royal Regatta HQ, Leander Club, The Little Angel PH, The Flower Pot PH and Thamesfield Village. Alternatively, I will be happy to come to your home with a Poppy Box if you either phone me, Pat Sly, on 01491 577925 or email patsly@tinyworld.co.uk.

If required, I have Gift Aid envelopes and would be happy to drop one through your door and call back later to collect. Contact details above.

Both the Poppy Boxes and Money Boxes this year have a QR Code for payment as many people no longer carry cash. Please donate whatever you feel able for the items.



A plastic-free poppy was unveiled with the launch on 26 October of the Royal British Legion's 2023 Appeal.

The paper design is the first change to the iconic poppy in 28 years. It is made from recyclable paper, with about 50% from discarded coffee cups and the rest from renewable fibres. The plastic-free poppy will not only enable people to support our armed forces community, but also continues the Royal British Legion's commitment to sustainability. The plastic-free poppy will be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppies to reduce any waste of poppies already produced.

Since the first poppy appeal in 1921, public donations have provided a lifeline for service people and their families. Averagely £47m is raised during the Poppy Appeal each year.

THINGS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT THE BRITISH LEGION POPPY

Wearing a poppy is a show of support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterans and their families. It represents all those who lost their lives on active service, from the beginning of the First World War right up to the present day.

It also honours the contribution of civilian services and the uniformed services which contribute to national peace and security and acknowledges innocent civilians who have lost their lives in conflict and acts of terrorism.

The poppy has been a symbol of Remembrance for over 100 years. The poppy became a symbol of Remembrance and hope for a peaceful future in the aftermath of the First World War. Since 1921, the British Legion Poppy Appeal collectors have been at the heart of the Poppy Appeal and this year they will be back in local communities across the UK to collect donations that help the Royal British Legion continue it's vital work.

The poppy is red because that's the natural colour of the poppy flower. During the First World War, previously beautiful countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over, again and again. The landscape swiftly turned to fields of mud where little or nothing could grow. Out of this devastation, the delicate but resilient bright red Flanders poppies grew and flourished in their thousands.

The red poppy directly supports the Armed Forces community. It is worn as a show of support for the Armed Forces communities across the UK, Allied Forces and the Commonwealth. Donations from the sale of our red poppies go directly towards helping the Armed Forces community.

Poppies weren't always sold with leaves. A leaf was first introduced in the 1960s and they slowly became an optional extra. By 1984, demand for them had grown to 12 million a year, and in 1995 poppies with leaves included were made available for the first time.

Donations for poppies helps families. Money raised during the Poppy Appeal helps The Royal British Legion support the Armed Forces community in lots of different ways, including providing financial advice to veterans struggling to adapt to civilian life.

Donations fund recovery services. The Poppy Appeal helps fund services like the Battle Back Centre - the first port of call for wounded, injured and sick service men and women as they start their Individual Recovery Program.

The money raised provides support to the Armed Forces community in six key areas: Financial Support, Advice, Employment, Mobility, Housing and Mental Health.
