## FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Remenham friends,

I now find myself somewhat unexpectedly in the middle of what might be called the “Yellow Crescent” – an unbroken band of Liberal Democrat constituencies that arc from Eastbourne on the Sussex coast to Ilfracombe in North Devon. This is certainly not something I anticipated when I moved to Henley in 2018! This development will no doubt be greeted with dismay by some of you, with enthusiasm by others, and perhaps by others with a sort of quiet acceptance of democracy doing its thing.

The relationship between Christian faith and politics is complex, and Christians can be found across the political spectrum. The basic organisational structures of the Church and the building blocks of Christian doctrine were assembled under conditions of intermittent persecution: whilst secularism is a relatively modern concept, the idea of separate realms for spiritual and temporal authority is very common throughout Christian history. And so Christians have been able to adapt themselves to radically different political systems in different times and places. And so, drawing on the Old Testament stories of David, the Lord’s anointed King, Christianity has at times been associated with absolute monarchy, as in early Stuart Britain or Ancien Régime France. On the other hand, Christianity’s intense consciousness of human fallibility probably has quite a lot to do with the development of liberal democracy, with its checks and balances, its limits on absolute power, and its emphasis on the rights of the electorate to boot out a government that is perceived to be failing.

One thing that unites Christians of all political stripes is the obligation to pray for our leaders, whether or not we agree with them. St Paul, who would die a martyr’s death under the Roman Emperor Nero, was very insistent on the importance of praying for kings and all in authority. The Book of Common Prayer includes a special collect for Parliament, and it would seem a particularly appropriate time to use it:

*"MOST gracious God, we humbly beseech thee, as for this Kingdom in general, so especially for the High Court of Parliament, under our most religious and gracious King at this time assembled: That thou wouldest be pleased to direct and prosper all their consultations to the advancement of thy glory, the good of thy Church, the safety, honour, and welfare of our Sovereign and his Dominions; that all things may be so ordered and settled by their endeavours, upon the best and surest foundations, that peace and happiness, truth and justice, religion and piety, may be established among us for all generations. These and all other necessities, for them, for us, and thy whole Church, we humbly beg in the Name and Mediation of Jesus Christ our most blessed Lord and Saviour. Amen."*

We also welcome Frances Plowman who joined the PCC at the APCM.

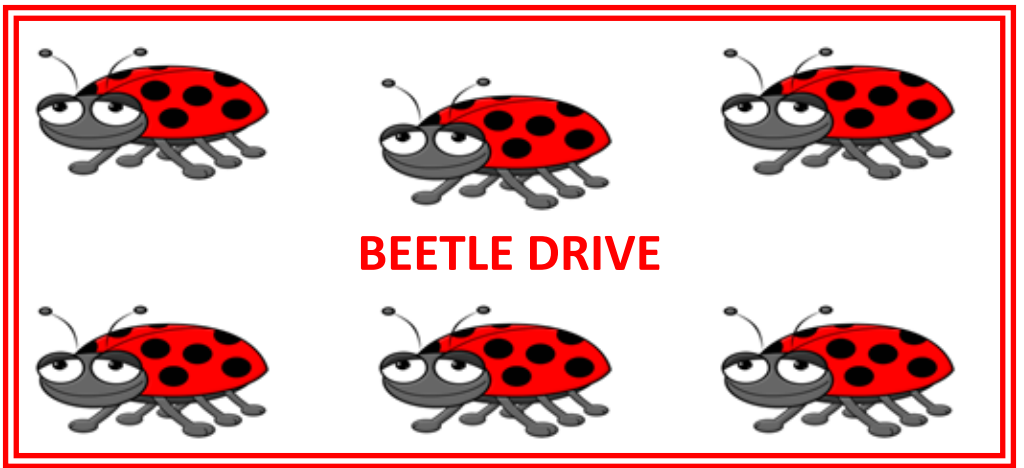
The church was busy over the May and June period. A number of weddings were held at the church and we wish all the brides and grooms a long and happy marriage.

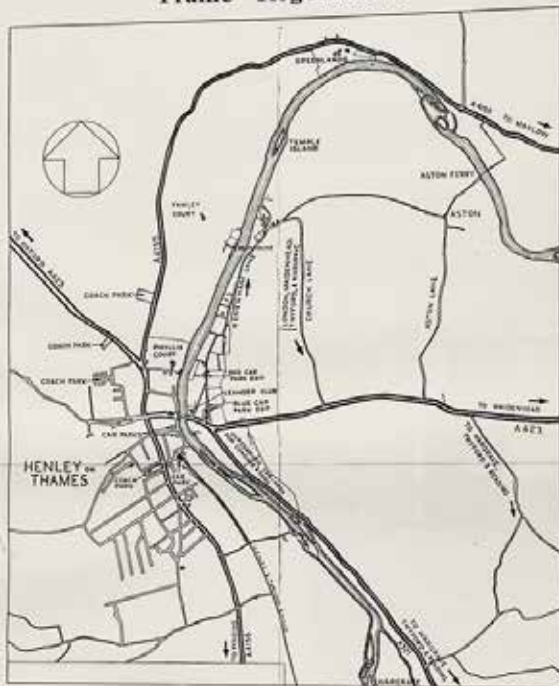

# HENLEY REGATTA

## Traffic Regulations.



### "ONE-WAY" TRAFFIC.

At the end of racing and until traffic becomes normal a "One-Way" Traffic System will be put into force in Rowing Lane and Church Lane, when no entry will be permitted into these lanes from A. 421. On Saturday, 4th July, the "One-Way" Traffic System will be suspended at 3 p.m.

### PARKING ARRANGEMENTS.

#### NEW ARMS CAR PARK.

This space near entrance of the Boat Park and the Blue Park.

Cars returning to London, Maidenhead, Windsor, Twyford or Reading will be parked in the Red Car Park and on leaving will turn left and proceed via Church Lane, turning left on to A. 421. Those wishing to travel in the direction of Reading, Twyford or Wargrave will turn right at Warren Row Turn and right again in a quarter of a mile to Wargrave.

Cars returning to Henley or in the direction of Oxford or High Wycombe will park in the Blue Car Park and on leaving turn right and proceed over Henley Bridge. No left turning will be permitted at the junction of Remondou Lane and A. 421 near Henley Bridge.

Exit from either of these Parks will at all times be via Remondou Lane.

#### WARGRAVE ROAD CAR PARK.

This Park should be approached by private cars from the direction of Wargrave or Henley.

#### PARKS ON THE OXFORDSHIRE SIDE.

It will be seen by the map that there are many Parks for coaches and private cars within easy reach of the river available on the Oxfordshire side.

If and where the Parks on the Berkshire side are full, vehicles will be directed to these Parks by the Oxfordshire Constabulary.

### RECOMMENDED ROUTES.

FROM THE DIRECTION OF MAIDENHEAD—All private vehicles turn right at Thicket Corner and proceed along A. 421 to Henley.

FROM THE DIRECTION OF READING—Proceed via A. 4 to Twyford Cross Roads, turn left via A. 321 to Henley.

FROM THE DIRECTION OF OXFORD AND HIGH WYCOMBE—Via A. 421 and A. 421A to Henley.

FROM THE SOUTH—Via A. 321 Twyford and Wargrave.

### COACHES.

Coaches for which no previous parking arrangements have been made will be parked in the Wargrave Road Parks. Those travelling from the direction of Maidenhead will be posted along A. 4 to Twyford Cross Roads and thence via A. 321 to the Wargrave Road Car Park.

Coaches conveying competitors will be posted near Henley Bridge and thence to the Competitors' Car Park.

### REMINDEES.

Start early & give out.

If you are the holder of an official car badge or windshield label, display this in a prominent position.

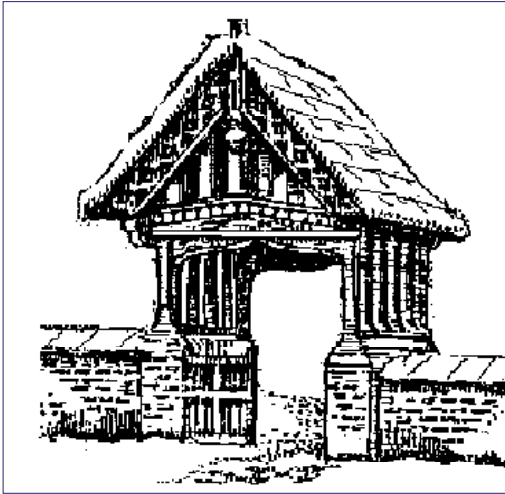

## NOTES FROM REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL



**July 2024**

Well, this is it fellow Remenham residents. The British summer is upon us with a vengeance. It feels as if we have had more water on our land than we enjoy seeing shoot down the river we know so well. Poor old Regatta had shocking weather and luckily, I am informed, the odd pint or two of Pimms took attendees' minds off the conditions.

Mother nature appears to be as confused as poor old Joe Biden..so who know what is around the corner.

That's enough padding of this article. I now feel duty bound to report on activities related to your wonderful team of Councillors. No amount of rain can dampen our spirits.

As I refer to my list of action areas I am reminded about what a busy period we have been through.

I would like to begin by thanking Wayne Smith, our local Wokingham councillor who has kindly attended our last three meetings. Hopefully because he enjoys them rather than feels we require his constant support. Wayne is proving invaluable in helping us connect effectively with WBC managers who can support the requests of the Parish.

A good case in point is that after 12 or more months of trying, we have now at last, succeeded in having the keep clear boxes at the junction of Remenham lane with the A4130 repainted. This means residents can now more easily join the traffic when turning right towards Henley. Still on Highways we have seen action to clear overgrown pavements on White Hill from WBC.

At our most recent meeting this week there was a wide ranging discussion on how we could attempt to improve traffic management around the many events in our lovely Parish. We have formally requested a follow up with Highways and will connect the issues raised here with our ongoing discussions around the hoped for Cumulative Impact Assessment.

Not all issues are resolved via WBC however. At the beginning of June, yours truly, ably assisted by Polly Hogan, took it upon ourselves to intervene and sort the unkempt appearance at the foot of White Hill. After 4 hours of combined effort we removed multiple buckets of weed and debris along the gutters and gave the base of the large tree a short back and sides to make for safer exits from Remenham Lane thanks to improved line of sight of oncoming traffic. (*See photos on next page.*) This also allows drivers and pedestrians a good view of the very healthy and attractive new flowerboxes sponsored by residents and HRR.

The defibrillator project moves on to hopeful conclusion. With one already installed at Hambledon lock we have now agreed to install the second unit at Whitehill Service station in an accessible position.

Our trusty Clerk, Paul, has spent an inordinate amount of time attempting to unravel the complexities of SSE and implement our requested cessation of contract for two street lamps. It has been a frustrating and ridiculously inefficient process but Paul's perseverance looks like it is about to pay off.

As a final note to this edition we continue to progress with cost estimates to potentially enable the reinstatement of the slipway at Aston ferry lane.



So thank you again if you have read this far and I wish all residents a trouble free and hopefully ( if you are participating ) very enjoyable Henley Festival.

If we find any Summer....do make the most of it.

How well do you know London? In May, Jean Sheppard presented *The London You Know and The London You Don't*, to Remenham W.I. She showed images of familiar London landmarks from unexpected angles with some unfamiliar facts. Who knew that the Thames Barrier was the second largest barrier in the world and could protect 125 sq. kilometres of central London from flooding? The OXO tower originally belonged to Royal Mail but in 1920, was sold and remodelled by the OXO Meat company, with windows in the shape of a cross that, with light shining through them showed the word OXO all over London. The Monument in Pudding Lane commemorates the Great Fire of London and is topped with a metal urn holding metal flames. You can climb into the dome of St. Paul's Cathedral if you can manage the 528 steps up (and down)! Who'd have known it?



Jean also took us on a virtual tour inside No.10 Downing Street, where she had been lucky enough to be taken on a tour with her late husband and friends. We saw the Cabinet Room, the Party Room for entertaining visiting guests, the library to which each Prime Minister can donate a book and the famous staircase lined with photographs of past Prime Ministers.

Members were reminded of the Book Club and the Ladies who Lunch at The George and Dragon, Wargrave, and the Speakers Selection Meeting.



Finally, members needed to vote on the Resolution going forward to the Annual Meeting at the Albert Hall in June. The Resolution asks the Government for more investment and training of dentists to provide better dental cover for everyone and the meeting unanimously voted to support the resolution.

## JUNE

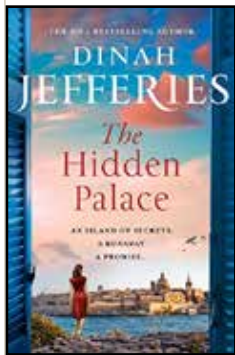
