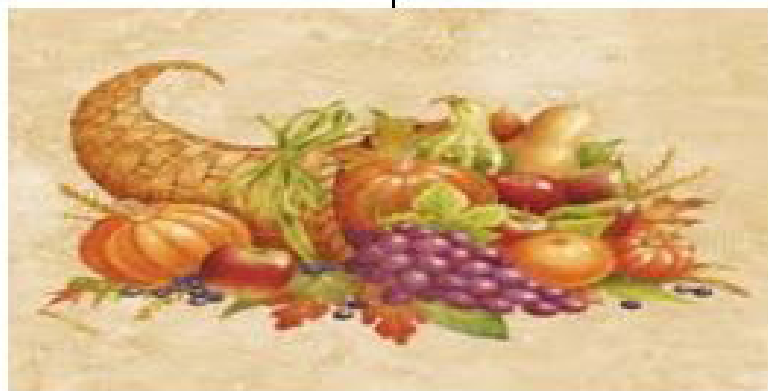

HEROES PARADE FOR OLYMPIC ROWERS



The Heroes Return after the Tokyo Olympics September 2021

HENLEY'S Olympians from Paris 2024 will be formally welcomed home on the morning of Saturday, 21 September, with an open-top bus parade through the town. All the Leander Club athletes who competed in Paris at both the Olympics and the Paralympics as well as their fellow Team GB rowers will be invited on the tour from the club to the town hall.

Thousands of people are expected to line the route of the parade, which will be led by a marching band. A row-past on the river is planned, before the athletes board the double-decker bus at Leander, just as there was after the last three Olympic Games in Tokyo, Rio and London.

The proposed parade route is a loop of the town centre then up Hart Street and into Market Place. The rowers will then disembark, be introduced to the crowd and sign autographs and pose for pictures.

This Olympic regatta has been one of the most successful for Team GB rowing in medal terms with three golds, two silvers and three bronzes. Out of 25 athletes from Henley, 20 of them came back with medals. Leander had athletes in every single boat and eight of the nine in the women's eight were from the club. It is a staggering achievement that no other town in the country can match and there isn't another club in the world which has won so many Olympic medals.

FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Remenham friends,

This month's letter is something more in the nature of a postcard, as I am writing from Paris where we are on holiday.

Paris is a city I have visited very many times, but not once in the last seventeen years. There is something very poignant about being back in a place that I used to know quite well, and which has changed enormously. Going back to a place on holiday can often make us acutely conscious of the passage of time: in the place we live each day we don't notice the change as it happens gradually around us; when we visit somewhere else, perhaps once a year, or once every couple of years, or just now and again, the changes are much more noticeable.

This visit to Paris has brought new joys: we are staying in a suburb in the south of the city, well away from the tourist hotspots. This morning we shopped in the wonderful local market, and visited the glorious Parc de Sceaux; two quite new experiences. But visiting the city centre brings a consciousness of change, not least the catastrophic fire and (so far incomplete) rebuilding of Notre Dame.

There is something very absolute about time. However much we would like to, we cannot pull moments out of our memories and relive them; and yet equally there are often things that we would like to forget that in some weird and unwelcome way stay with us.

“For everything there is a season and a time for every matter under heaven”, writes the writer of the Book of Ecclesiastes, one of the Wisdom books of the Old Testament:

a time to be born and a time to die;
a time to plant and a time to pluck up what is planted;
a time to kill and a time to heal;
a time to break down and a time to build up;
a time to weep and a time to laugh;
a time to mourn and a time to dance...

Many people have found consolation in these words, suggesting as they do that our times unfold with order and purpose. For there to be order and purpose in the unfolding of the times and seasons of our lives presupposes the existence of a God who stands outside of time, in whom all times are held. Whilst our pasts may in some respects be lost to us, there is a sense in which all our experiences are held in the unfathomable depths of the mind of God.

There is a great prayer, traditionally said at nighttime, that voices something of the puzzle of time and eternity:

Be present, O merciful God,
and protect us through the silent hours of this night,
so that we who are wearied
by the changes and chances of this fleeting world,
may repose upon thy eternal changelessness;
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

NOTES FROM REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL



August 2024

Welcome back to yet another Newsletter report. It is a mere 5 weeks since the last missive left my computer and half-way into August I hope somebody is left in the Parish to read these efforts!

As ever, the weather deserves a mention as we have just enjoyed the hottest day of the year and about time too. Regatta was a weather wash out but otherwise feedback appears positive. Henley Festival benefitted from far more clement weather and from my own experience delivered some star performances in a unique setting.

The cooler wetter start to the year seems to have resulted in fewer bugs and flies than normal which the ecologists around will tell us may not be such a good outcome for our gardens...even if it means we don't have to spend every day vacuuming them off our kitchen floors.

By now, the many sharp readers in the Parish will already have worked out that I have less to report on than usual so no more padding from me.

RPC met on 8th July and like the rest of the country awarded itself the customary 'no meeting in August' award.

On planning matters we were yet again discussing submissions relating to Henley Bridge. On this occasion the topic was proposed and necessary repairs to the infrastructure. Of possible interest to all is that meters detecting the propensity of the bridge to wobble identified such movement when two large buses (or one assumes, lorries) cross on the bridge. Findings have been shared with both Wokingham and Oxford Councils who have been asked to assure that the movements are within safe ranges (which we believe they are) but better safe than sorry.

The third major annual event in our Parish, Rewind Festival is welcoming the first guests as I type. Local residents and RPC met with the organiser at a planning meeting on Monday 12th August where the summary view was that most heavy vehicles were obeying the traffic plans but we were able to highlight 4 notable exceptions including two huge cranes turning up outside Remenham Church. Nearly everyone is welcome at the church but even Father Jeremy may agree we don't need giant cranes!

The Organisers did agree to distribute resident's passes for up to four vehicles per property to enable locals to avoid chaos on the hill. We also have agreed a wash up meeting to review the Festival management mid September.

Chair and Deputy Chair (Polly Hogan) had a follow up meeting with the head of WBC licensing committee to discuss progress on the Cumulative Impact policy which is currently being drafted for Remenham. We are to receive a consultation document by year end and the Policy is expected to be agreed in March 2025. Our objective is to avoid event creep resulting in traffic jams every week of the summer. We are the smallest Parish in Wokingham Borough and undeniably have the most annual visitors.

On lighter matters we agreed that the nature trail on Wargrave road would be strimmed by contractors over the remaining summer and to assess Parish footpaths for the same treatment.

Monday saw the inauguration of the new rubbish and recycling scheme in the borough. Please do your best to conform and we may collectively improve recycling and reduce landfill. Anyone experiencing difficulty is recommended to liaise with WBC who will consider flexing for those with problems managing the bins. If that doesn't work please let your local councillor know and we will do our best to resolve.

Below is stage 1 of a RPC hands on project to rescue the previously abandoned and overgrown telephone box at the top of Aston Lane. Councillor Nigel Williams attacked 10 years of neglect, ivy and weeds to transform the appearance. But there is more.....!



RPC is engaging a local contractor to straighten the box, strip old paint and damaged glazing to effectively return it close to its original glory. We will install maps for walkers and probably a book exchange for the community.

That's all for now. I hear a cork in the top of a chilled bottle of wine shouting for release in my kitchen.

Enjoy the rest of the Summer - and please come along to Remenham Fayre on Sunday 1st September.

July

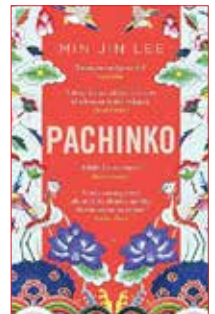

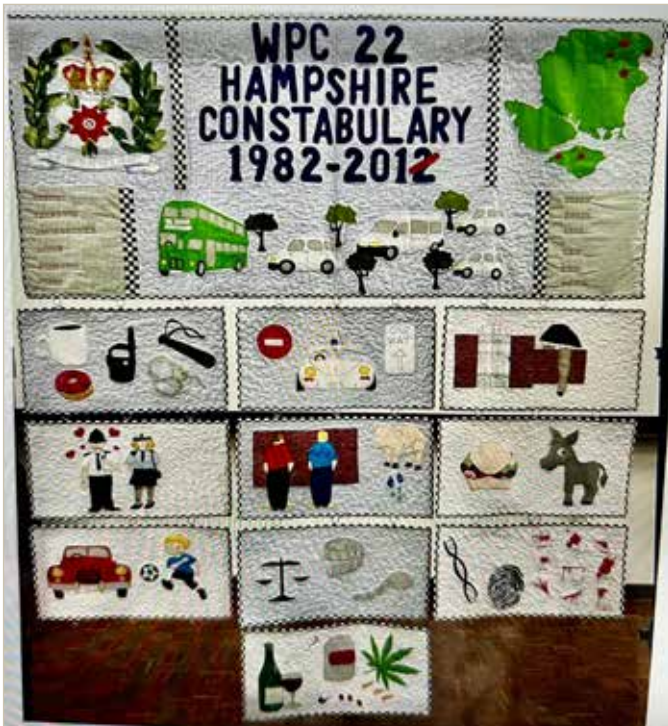


August
