The craft are all imaginatively and wonderfully decorated. There have been many themes over the last few years – James Bond, Mamma Mia, Only Fools and Boats, Unicorns, Popeye, Under the Sea, Pirates – even a 7' penguin!

The building and houses from the Bridge to Fawley Court are also brilliantly and colourfully lit, and approximately 3000 spectators watch the parade from both sides of the river. It is a marvellous spectacle!

Leander Club throws open its doors to the public for this one night of the year, so everyone can come in and see the prize-giving. There are bars and food trucks available for refreshments, so it truly is a full evening of entertainment for the whole family.

Dear All,

I must start by remembering Mike Dowsett, our Churchwarden Emeritus who died in July. He gave so much time to St Nicholas for which we are truly grateful. We have been busy on the maintenance front. As you can see from the photographs above the Upper Churchyard has a new boundary fence on the side bordering Remenham Church Lane. The previous fence had fallen into disrepair some time ago and was overgrown with ivy and fallen branches. A pathway had formed from Remenham Church Lane into the Upper Churchyard and although strictly it was on Highways land, it had become very steep and there were concerns from a safety perspective. Moreover, as the graveyard is still open, some of the people using this pathway were not respecting the new graves causing upset to visiting friends and family. In the autumn the intention is to plant some shrubs to form a country hedge so the fence will be less visible. A big thank you to Oscar Sly for doing this. A great job!

We have also been repairing the wall that surrounds the church by replacing some of the bricks and mortar. This will help to keep the church and graveyards in good repair.

This summer has seen seven weddings and we wish all the newly wed couples the best for the future and hope they enjoyed their day at St Nicholas.

FROM THE RECTOR

(This is a reprint of the 'Thought for the week', published in the Henley Standard on 1 August)

"The request to write this week's "thought" found me lying in the sun at the Kumpula Lido in Helsinki. The pool was built for the 1952 Olympics, but there was nothing Olympic about my afternoon of reading in the sun, interspersed with breaks for a little gentle swimming and a session in the sauna.

The word "holiday" has Christian roots: the origin of many of our holidays can be found in Holy Days, such as Christmas, Epiphany, Easter and Pentecost, and the many saints' days of the church's calendar. People were given the day off work so they could attend church and enjoy festivities appropriate to the day. Rest, recreation and merriment, time with family and friends: such things are recognised by the Christian tradition as vital to human flourishing.

Right at the beginning of the Bible we find the extraordinary creation narrative, which describes God as working to create the world through six days, before resting on the seventh day, taking delight in the "very good" work of creation. And so we find that rhythms of activity and rest are a feature of the natural world. Day and night, the turn of the seasons, the hibernation of animals, the dormant seed in the ground: the alternation of work and rest can be discerned in both the plant and animal kingdoms.


"If all the year were playing holidays", says Prince Hal in Shakespeare's Henry IV Part 1, "to sport would be as tedious as to work". Work and holiday stand in relation to one another. Work is essential to human flourishing just as is rest and recreation. It enables us to provide for the material needs of ourselves and our families, to contribute to the relief of those in need, and to the broader common good. It gives meaning, purpose and shape to our lives. And yet just a few minutes' thought will tell us that we live in a time of multiple challenges to a healthy balance of work and rest. There are those who whether for reasons of poverty or ambition or temperament are led to overwork, making insufficient time for leisure and the enjoyment of family life and friendship. And there are those who for many and various reasons have no work. And there is the ominous challenge of artificial intelligence and robotics, which many experts argue have the potential to completely transform the nature of work.

During this holiday season perhaps I could encourage you to reflect on your lives, and on the relative priority you give to work, rest and play? Is there a sense of healthy balance appropriate to your stage of life? And perhaps I could encourage you to reflect too on the broader social dimensions of work, rest and play, and the challenges of worklessness, overwork, and radical new technologies?

But that's more than enough: after all, I am supposed to be on holiday! Before I head off to the beach for my morning swim, I wish all of you time for rest and relaxation this summer!"

NOTES FROM REMENHAM PARISH COUNCIL



August 2025

Well, if you wished for a warm hot summer....it has been granted. But as the saying goes....do be careful what you wish for. Perhaps, instead, you may want to join my recently formed Remenham Rain Dance club, which has been singularly

ineffective!

Good old Brits we are....complaining about the weather whatever the conditions.

Not many complaints about our weather from the organisers of Henley Royal Regatta, Henley Festival and this week's imminent Rewind festival, where human lobsters will once more be widely available. Yet again our beautiful Parish has been hosting thousands of happy attendees to these large scale events, plus numerous other people gatherings in the shape of runs, walks and Corporate Charity events.

Increasingly, with the help of local residents, we have been demanding well considered and well executed traffic management plans from all event organisers to reduce (but sadly not remove) the risk of residents becoming stranded, in or away from their homes during events.

This year it appears Regatta and Festival ran relatively smoothly and fingers crossed for a similar verdict on Rewind.



Dog bin management has been on the agenda of recent meetings and hopefully the addition of some larger bins will reduce the risk of badly behaved owners leaving dog bags randomly around our Parish. We have also had frequent rubbish problems at the end of Ferry Lane in Aston where too many visitors have been simply piling their waste beside the bins. This is too big an attraction for the local wildlife so we have asked for more frequent emptying via WBC and have increased the capacity of the bins. We are now asking visitors to take their waste home with them if the bins are full.

With excellent support from our borough councillor Wayne Smith we have engaged directly with the drain supremo at WBC and hopefully the Culham Lane floods will no longer blight that road. We also visited the flood sites at Aston Lane and the bottom of White Hill where severely blocked drains result in bad flooding if and when it rains again. Action on the latter two issues may restore our faith in the WBC highways team, although we will need a response and action on the damaged railings on Remenham Lane before we let them off the hook.

I hope, like me, you can smile as you pass the railings at the bottom of White Hill which are adorned with the magnificent flower boxes. This was a successful RPC initiative carried over from last year and we should thank Henley Royal Regatta for contributing to the upkeep.



I personally visited Lockdown Lodge at Hambledon Lock twice in the past month and I know many other Parishoners have also thoroughly enjoyed the happy environment created there. I commend it strongly to all, but more as a diary note for next year as the Lodge has now closed for 2025.

Yet again we are reminded how fortunate we are to live in such a wonderful location. One of the key priorities for RPC is to strike the delicate balance of welcoming visitors whilst requiring them to respect our Parish.

Our next Parish meeting is on Monday 15th September and as always, everyone is welcome.

Please enjoy the rest of the Summer and get set for the extravaganza that is the Remenham Fayre on 7th September.

(Extracts from a tribute by her son Robert)

The last time I saw my mother at the Regatta, she didn't say her usual 'Hello Darling', just: 'I hear you were looking simply ghastly yesterday!' So Mum, you'll be glad to know that I am wearing a proper suit today.



Your many, wonderful letters confirm that there is a lot to say about Sarah West. I am going to try to sum her up in three areas: **people**, **purpose** and **picnics**. But first, a little history...

History: Sarah was born in Maidenhead in 1941, only daughter of Derek Mays-Smith and Ann Fraser, who died when Mum was three. She then went to live with Granny Fraser in Marlow. It was a comfortable and loving home. As an only child Mum became very close to her many cousins. In a family with no shortage of strong, independent, and occasionally terrifying, women, Mum's childhood nickname was Scare!

At 9 Sarah started at St George's Ascot. It was, according to Judy Bate, like a boy's prep school, but much nicer! She made lifelong friends and 12 of them celebrated their 70th birthdays together. Although Mum loved school, school didn't always love her. Following some 'high spirits' at the 5th Form Dance, Mum was asked to leave. When history repeated itself Mum's first reaction was always to support the culprit and not the school.

By now Derek had married Ivona, and the family home became Sagamore, on the river in Shiplake. Sarah gained a new mother and a sort of brother in Hugo Yorke-Davies.

Next came Finishing school in Switzerland, where she achieved the remarkable double of neither learning to ski, nor speak French. Despite this she still passed her one qualification: An Advanced Certificate in Conversational French - as she never tired of reminding us.

On returning to London, she went to Constance Spry - becoming an excellent cook and flower arranger. And then onto Secretarial at McNutt, leading to her one paid job: a sales negotiator with Douglas and Gordon, albeit there was apparently a touch of the St George's about her departure! At McNutt's Mum met Joey Huw-Williams, who introduced her to Stinker.

At their own wedding Dad said marrying Mum was like marrying an iceberg. He meant that there was a huge family below the surface, others thought it a less flattering analogy! It was, however, the start to the most successful of marriages, lasting nearly 59 years.

People: Sarah was a people person. Large family, infinite friends, friends' children, children's friends, grandchildren's friends. A recurring theme of the letters, was how interested in people she was, how she was always asking questions, hungry for the latest news.

One of my earliest memories is of people saying: three boys, poor you. And it's true: Tim and Charlie could be quite a handful! But she loved it and was a natural. She was one of the few mothers



who would shout at other people's children, but that was because she treated them as her own, and would be equally quick to defend them. Mum loved a full house, but was quick to descend in her nightie to point out when it became too loud, for too long. As Archie said, if you saw the nightie three times, you knew you should leave before breakfast.

Mum mellowed, like the whisky she enjoyed, and became a very laid-back granny. Her grandchildren loved trips to Remenham, Cornwall and Covent Garden. Her unconventional approach to parenting included testing Tim's swimming by throwing him out of a dinghy in the middle of the Thames. A week later, in an irony not lost on her sons, she joined the Henley committee of the NSPCC.

Purpose: And that brings me onto purpose. Alongside her role as a matriarch, Mum was a massive support to Dad, allowing him to have both successful legal and charity careers.

Sarah was a pillar of the community, and a great supporter of the Remenham community. She felt strongly, given her good fortune, she should give back. She was always looking out for people, particularly the lonely. She was a committed Anglican and a stalwart of the Church here for 55 years, organising the flowers and much else. She also chaired the Parish Council and was a governor of both St George's and Crazies Hill Primary.

She was extremely generous to her family, and in supporting many charities. She was also a major benefactor of Marlow Rowing club, who named a boat after her. Mum also loved her home community. Daily coffee breaks with housekeepers, Mrs Worthington, Georgina and Kelly - and for over 40 years - Jonathan, her friend and gardener.

Mum was a regular on the tennis court - allegedly, the chat lasted longer than the rallies. Given her river upbringing she was a natural on the water: a tidy sculler, competent sailor and extremely patient waterski driver. She also loved racing with Dad – horses rather more than sailing – and they had a lot of fun, and some luck, as National Hunt owners. Travel was another passion, always booking at least two holidays ahead.

There was one instance where Mum's community spirit deserted her. She was called to Jury Service over Henley week and threatened with a fine if she did not appear. 'How much?' she replied, quick as a flash. And that brings us onto picnics.

Picnics: The regatta was a big part of Mum's life. Her father was a Steward, winning most of the main events as both oarsman and coach, and her male cousins also rowed at the top level. The Enclosure was her lawn, and was improved, for countless other people, by her generosity and talent for entertaining.

That didn't stop her also firmly policing her sons' regular excesses. And true to form, those of our friends too. Steve said that he was delighted to hear that I was marrying Ness, but rather alarmed by the prospect of two Mrs Wests at Henley! Charles was reminded every year that Henley wasn't just a five-day beer festival - advice he's been happy to ignore. But we all did learn the very fair mantra 'that Henley doesn't just happen you know'. Sarah was a brilliant

host of more than just picnics. A wedding, twenty firsts, 55 years of Regatta house parties and Henley Sunday lunches on the lawn at home, amongst the most memorable.

As I come to the end, I am aware that so much of this entertaining, boating, traveling, racing and giving was done in the brilliant partnership she had with Stinker. They really were the perfect couple.

Even though she struggled physically in later life, she never lost her mental sharpness or optimism. Sarah West enjoyed life to the full and found joy in everything, and everyone, for all her 83 years.

MIKE DOWSETT

(Extracts from a tribute by his daughter, celebrating a Life of Fun, Laughter and Full Throttle)

Michael John Dowsett – known to absolutely everyone as **Mike** – was born in London in 1928, before returning with his family to Henley. He was the eldest of three boys – with younger brothers Dave and Adrian – and from the very beginning, there was a mischievous sparkle in his eye that never really faded. From an early age, Mike discovered two great loves: speed and bikes. And so began a lifelong obsession that earned him the nickname **"Mike the Bike"** – a name he wore like a badge of honour. Whether it was racing, fixing, polishing, or simply admiring, bikes were never far from his mind... or his garage. The Isle of Man TT races were his spiritual home – he'd visit regularly, walk the course, ride the course and tackle the bends with a kind of fearless excitement most of us would reserve for roller coasters.

In his late teens, Mike co-founded the **Henley Motor Cycle Club** with his good friend Tony Hodge. And to this day, the original club sign still hangs in pride of place in the garage.

Mike also threw himself into motorbike scrambling, a noisy and muddy pursuit that filled his weekends with adrenaline and laughter. He later tackled the London to Brighton Veteran Bike Rally, not for the glory, but for the sheer joy of it. His pride and joy? A gleaming **BSA Gold Star** motorbike which he knew inside out and polished like a prized jewel.



Mike's fun-loving spirit even extended to romance. He met his beloved Eileen at a dance at Henley Town Hall and they married in St Nicholas church in 1957. When the time came to choose between his motorbike or buying a car for the new family, Mike's solution? Keep the bike... and just add a sidecar! So off they'd go — Mike and Eileen zipping around the Henley countryside, sideby-side in every way.

Family life was never dull. There was always a bike in the driveway, and usually a project on the go. Mandy, still in nappies, was taken out on the bike before she could walk. And when Andrew was a teenager, Mike gifted a Honda 90cc moped – not realising that Mandy would jump on first, tear down the garden and crash into the apple tree. Mike found it annoyingly funny, of course.

Aside from bikes, Mike was a crack shot – quite literally. A keen marksman with the Henley Trinity and Watlington Rifle Clubs, he had a whole bureau full of medals and trophies – and more importantly, stories to go with every single one.

Mike was never still. He ran Henley Boys Football Club, coached the kids, drove them to matches and kept himself super fit doing it. If he wasn't at the pitch, he was pottering at his bench, testing something, or diagnosing car faults by ear – and he was always right, of course.

At the age of 15, he joined Hammants – a shop that somehow combined electrical goods, shotguns and motorbikes – which was basically Mike's version of heaven. It wasn't just a job, it was a playground throughout his working life. The team there was tight-knit, full of knowledge and even fuller of mischief.

St Nicholas church meant a lot to Mike. He became a Church Warden in 2005 and loved every second – especially weddings and christenings, where he'd quietly bask in the joy of others. When Eileen's health declined, Mike cared for her with unwavering love and total dedication, never once complaining, even managing to take her out and bring her to church with him.

After Eileen passed, Mike didn't slow down. For his 90th birthday, he celebrated in Helsinki, soaking up the long daylight hours with boat trips, food and a great sense of fun. He gave up driving in his final years, but didn't let a dodgy knee or anything else keep him in. He had wonderful carers – Wisdom, George and Fidelis – who not only helped him, but shared laughs, Jenga games, and plenty of Mike's tales.

He was the life of the party, the prankster, the storyteller, the gentleman. He made everyone feel welcome and made everyone laugh. His legacy isn't just the stories, the medals, or the motorcycles – it's the warmth, the laughter, and the memories of a life fully and joyfully lived.

A recent tribute on Henley Past and Present was flooded with comments — "fun," "kind," "a true gentleman." That's Mike. And that's how we'll always remember him — with a smile on our face, a chuckle in our throat, and a heart full of gratitude for the time we had with him.
