WARNING - DANGEROUS BEND!

The sharp bend in Remenham Lane as you approach White Hill is narrow and dangerous, as we saw when a vehicle drove into the side of The Little Angel at high speed last Sunday.









Ted Docherty the landlord said it was "miraculous" that his staff escaped without serious injuries after the car crashed into the kitchen wall in the middle of dinner service, tearing a hole in the side of the Grade II listed building. All the equipment on one side of the kitchen concertinaed across to the other side. Five staff members were inside at the time and one suffered minor injuries.

This was not only a dreadful shock for the Little Angel kitchen staff, but was hugely inconvenient as the kitchen had to be shut the next day at short notice to customers. A temporary stud wall was built to allow the kitchen to keep running while the hole was patched up. Workmen were on the site until 1.30am on Monday morning, making sure the roof was structurally sound. The pub managed to re-open in time for dinner service that day.

REMENHAM PARISH WALK, 11 OCTOBER

On Saturday 11 October a parish walk took place in Remenham to raise funds for the running of Remenham Parish Hall, a much used and loved community asset for Remenham.

There were two walks: a longer walk of six miles for the heartier walker and a shorter one of two miles for the less hearty and the small children. Both walks started off by going up the

river to Leander and then through the woods to Remenham Church Lane and then diverged either to return to the Hall for the shorter walk or on via Aston Lane, through the Culham Estate to Aston and back to Remenham.

Thirty people took part varying in age from 18 months to over 80 accompanied by numerous dogs. The walk finished in the hall where the walkers enjoyed a lunch of homemade soup and bread and cheese.

The event raised in excess of £1,000.





REMENHAM HARVEST SUPPER

There was a record number of attendees at the Remenham Harvest Supper on Friday 17 October – 54 in all. The hall looked fabulous with long tables adorned with colourful



napkins, seasonal flowers and night lights. A delicious supper of homemade cottage pie and apple crumble (washed down with a glass of wine!) was much enjoyed.

Many thanks to all who provided pies and crumbles; helped run the bar, serve, clear up, wash up and put everything away. The evening was a very jolly community event and raised £1,096 for St Nicholas.



FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Remenham friends,

This coming Sunday being the Sunday nearest St Nicholas' Day (6th December), we celebrate our Patronal Festival, with drinks in church after Matins. Everyone is welcome.

The precise origins of our parish church, and its dedication to St Nicholas, are lost in the mists of time. All we know for certain is that a church was recorded at Remenham in the Domesday Book, so its origins are Norman or earlier.

The origins of the cult of St Nicholas are a little less obscure: we know that he was the Bishop of the city of Myra in what is now Turkey, although at that time it was a Greekspeaking community. He lived in the fourth century. The reliability of the many and various stories associated with St Nicholas is uncertain, but there is a definite consistency in the picture of the character that emerges from these stories: generosity and compassion for those in need or trouble, and especially for children.

But how did this saint, who lived his life on the sunny slopes of the south coast of Asia Minor, come to be the patron of our lovely albeit rather cold and damp parish?

Nicholas was a hugely popular saint in medieval England. A quick search on google maps identifies many churches dedicated to him in our locality: Rotherfield Greys, Ibstone, Hurst, Earley, Britwell Salome... He seems to have come over with the Normans.

As the patron saint of sailors, he is often associated with ports – both Liverpool and Bristol have historic parish churches dedicated to him. But we're quite a long way from the sea!

His patronage of merchants seems unlikely to connect him with our rural parish church.


I will not be mirch the reputation of previous generations of Remenhamites by suggesting that it is in connection with his patronage of repentant thieves that our church is dedicated to him!

I would like to think that it was rather St Nicholas' association with generosity and compassion that led our medieval predecessors to adopt him as their patron: as we come to celebrate St Nicholas Day, may we too seek to live in a spirit of generosity and compassion.

Wishing you all a very happy Christmas when it comes – if I don't see you in person!

I believe we are now officially permitted to wish each other a Happy Christmas, so please do your very best to have one. It is a lovely time of year to be in Remenham and I recommend dragging yourself away from the log fire to meet your fellow residents at the St Nicholas Carol Service on Sunday 21st December. (timings elsewhere in this newsletter) The world of course could always be a happier place but my advice is to focus on yourself family and friends and forget the other miseries.

My goodness, I nearly missed my rant re the weather. The leaves are just about all down and there is a seasonally appropriate nip in the air. A very bold mole has chosen to violate my front lawn which sadly means my goodwill cup is running low as far as he / she is concerned. But our Parish , as ever, lifts the soul, whenever a patch of blue sky scuds past. If you are able, do get your stout footwear on and head out for a healthy stroll.

Hopefully the lanes, paths and towpaths will be litter free and if not do your best and bring a bit home to dispose of. Your Parish council has recently upped its game on litter bins so you won't have to walk too far to find one. Particularly helpful for dog walkers the vast majority of whom clear up as society expects. Thank you to everyone who does their bit to keep this Remenham Parish so well presented.

Recent Parish meetings have covered familiar ground on planning, traffic, waste and environmental concerns. Our trusty clerk, Paul Sermon has been assiduously following up on action points on our behalf. We have approved the purchase of multiple vehicle monitoring devices so we have the necessary data to manage traffic appropriately around event management. Your chair and deputy chair had a constructive meeting with The Copas Partnership to share thoughts on how best to balance their commercial objectives with the quiet enjoyment needs of local parishioners. With goodwill on all sides we can I believe work together in a mutually acceptable way.

The much heralded Cumulative Impact Assessment consultative document remains awaited from WBC planning.

We are still moving ahead to spend the CIL (community infrastructure levies) as required by WBC. Sadly, there is a sense of Groundhog Day as approved projects such as the Aston slipway reinstatement await the benign river conditions necessary to implement the work. Keep your fingers crossed for spring.

Wokingham Highways continue to disappoint us in terms of responsiveness to requests. We will keep pressing for better support on drainage and highway matters. Those of you who dare to drive down Aston Lane will be familiar with its blocked drain and crumbling road surface at the midway point. Please feel free to report your observations on the WBC highways website. The more submissions we make the more likely we are to receive solutions. We have a similar concern with a drain at the bottom of White Hill.



Unfortunately this is still a thing of the present

You may have noticed building work commenced on the Cottage between Leander and Henley Bridge recently. It was discovered that tree root activity had resulted in the wall next to the pavement being at risk of collapse. Once again, quick intervention from RPC, in the shape of Paul Sermon meant WBC and Oxford district council agreed to a remediation plan for the wall, and a temporary solution to keep the footpath open.

With Christmas a mere three weeks away please remain healthy, happy, and as prosperous as our politicians permit!




course accompanied by countless cups of tea. A donation of £100 will be made to the Church funds from this event.


The afternoon finished with another delightful tea and with Rosemary winning the raffle.









REMENHAM HISTORY WEEKEND PARISH HALL - WEEKEND OF 18 APRIL NEXT YEAR (TBC)

Recent conversations in the parish have highlighted numerous fascinating events and people that underpin what a great village we are privileged to be a part of. The Parish Hall Committee is now looking to collect and share these memories and celebrate both our past and present at a local history event (tentatively scheduled for the weekend of 18th April 2026). We are also hoping to create a lasting legacy by putting together a record of the event/weekend for the Remenham Website so future neighbours will be able to enjoy what we are able to find out.

Remenham has an incredibly rich and varied history including a notation in the Domesday Book; home to royalty; and a hub for agriculture and sports.

Although we are all acquainted with Henley Royal Regatta taking place each year from the banks of our side of the river and the numerous rowing clubs that call Remenham home, we have also housed the Henley swimming baths, a small golf course, tennis courts, the 1908 and 1948 rowing races of the Olympics and to this day the Henley Cricket Club.

We have also had more than our fair share of village hostelries, although the Carpenters Arms, the Two Brewers and Five Horseshoes are now no longer active pubs. Over forty years of the Henley Festival have also created a lasting legacy of fun evenings on our side of the Thames.

Park Place was famously owned by Prince Frederick, Duke of York, as well as being the movie set of the modern adaptation of St Trinian's and there are a significant number of architecturally significant properties for our size. The church has merited special note in many guidebooks for the area.

Agriculture has featured prominently with lavender being grown in significant quantities, nurseries and farms within our boundaries. A school, post office, eccentric characters and village policemen have all played their part in local lore.

In order to refresh our local history and to collect and share more recent interesting reminiscences for our remarkable village we'd like to ask you to search your memories, bottom drawers and attics for anything relating to Remenham.

Perhaps there's a fascinating tale relating to a person or place such as the school (which still operated in living memory), pubs, church or sporting activities? *continued*
